RENTS.

The National Bank Act of 1862, and the Legal Tender Act of 1863, those stupendous schemes of paper-money, conferred no greater or more lasting benefit upon any class or interest than upon landlords and rental valuations. The depreciation in real estate that occurred in 1861 afforded capitalists an opportunity of buying properties at prices which were only a fraction of what rule in the present crisis. And these same capitalists had the gratification of finding in less than two years that, under the impetus of inflation, the rents they were able to secure from this same property amounted in many cases to 25 per cent. or 50 per cent. of the purchase price. These fabulous rents have been maintained with scarcely any shrinkage or decline until within a year or two past. Even the panic of 1873 produced very little effect on rental values, on account of the spasm of inflation which attended that event, and the influence of which lasted far into the Summer of 1874, the period of the Great Veto. Landlords who had occasion to make fresh engagements in May, 1874, were sustained in their appraisements of rental valuations by the likelihood of additional expansion of the currency. Those leases, made in 1874, where taken by solvent parties, are still in existence, and their baneful effect continues to be felt. Even the present season, in the midst of exhaustion, depreciation and stagnation, has found landlords but little inclined to meet the exigencies of tenants, on account of their looking forward to the influx of strangers consequent upon the Centennial Exhibition as a means of "bolstering" up their extravagant rents. We have heretofore adverted to this subject, and think we can claim to-day a realization of the very state of things which we predicted. The month of May has come and gone. The Exhibition is under full headway, and yet our New York hotels have met with little or no increase of business, and, with the exception of the most fashionable quarter of the city, and the most prosperous business sections, where property is always in demand, and liberal rents cheerfully paid, we see on every hand notices of "to let" and empty stores, indicative of the unprofitable harvest which our overreaching landlords are now reaping. The stubbornness and impracticability of landowners generally are proverbial, but have never received a more striking illustration than in

the case of our New York landlords during the present season. We have heard of one prominent landlord who notified his tenants with amazing condescension that they could retain occupation of his premises at a reduction of ten per cent. from old valuations. The empty houses and stores which are left upon his hands will convince him that "it takes two to make a bargain," and that landlords are no longer masters of the situation. After enduring this state of emptiness for six months or a year, these former tenants, in all likelihood, will in turn notify the landlord of a willingness to reoccupy the old premises at a reduction of 50 per cent. from the former rentals. It is undeniable that the question of rental valuation enters into and forms a considerable factor in all the ramifications of business and domestic life; and the exorbitant rents, which have been so persistently maintained during the past ten or twelve years by New York landlords, have resulted in incalculable injury to our mercantile and family life. The pretensions of landlords to-day constitute the principal incubus which hangs about the neck of our prosperity. The stunted growth of our city, its oblong shape, and the dearth of Rapid Transit, all combine to favor these pretensions; and in default of widespread building activity, we can look alone to the dire and unmitigated disasters that now rest upon our business interests as the best means of bringing landlords to their senses, and of placing our city in the matter of rental valuation on a competitive plane with other cities. In the face of a decline in vacant property amounting to between sixty and seventy-five per cent., and in some cases of ninety per cent., with completed street improvements over nearly the whole surface of our island, together with a reduction in the price of labor of sixty per cent., and of materials forty per cent., it is easy to foresee that the combination on the part of the landlords to maintain rents will ere long succumb. The rental valuations that landlords are now endeavoring to force upon the public are based on old valuations of property. As new structures spring up, created on the basis of reduced cost of production, new and more enterprising landlords will appear, who will be able successfully to compete with those of antiquated ideas, or with those who have foolishly invested in improved property at fabulously high prices. All our improved property must be marked down to the plane of the values of to-day, and rental incomes must be based upon these new values. The shrinkage of invested capital must be charged to profit and loss, and our landlords, in common with all other classes of business men, must accept the situation, and no longer hinder the struggling prosperity of our citizens at large. As high rents contributed in as large a degree as any other cause to the creation and maintenance of high prices generally, so, at the

present time, low rents, within the easy ability of tenants to pay, must be the initial point of the new departure. The rents of all classes of store and dwelling accommodations must be made to conform to the new order of things. Thus the necessities of life will be easily attainable at reduced figures, and the workingman and the merchant will no longer be cheated out of their hard-earned reward. The long line of untenanted stores on Broadway may be attributed principally to the mulish stubbornness of landlords. Were the rents of these properties fixed at reasonable and sensible rates, it is safe to say that they would be eagerly taken, and that but few vacancies would be found. The Broadway owners, however, having been surfeited, above all others, with exorbitant rents, are the least willing to conform to the new state of things, and are contented to suffer the loss of many months or years of rent before they will yield to common sense. The natural law of revulsion, however, is in full operation, and will ultimately carry with its force even these unwilling owners. The wisest of them will be the first to yield. There is an example of one owner who has already kept his stores vacant for seven years, and it is not unlikely that some others will be found of the same mind. We may expect to find a number of stores on that thoroughfare remain idle for five or ten years to come.

The condition of affairs in regard to dwelling property is very plainly asserted. Except in the strictly fashionable quarter, where few vacancies can be met with, the unrented houses in this city may be counted by hundreds, if not thousands. Houses renting for fifteen hundred or two thousand dollars, heretofore considered of the average rate, are without tenants to-day. Many of that class of tenants, under the pressure of the times, have sought refuge in the numerous apartment houses that have been erected within the last three years, where they have found comfortable homes at one-half or one-third the rates demanded for a whole house. As is often the case, the landlords who hold out most stoutly at first are the ones to give way most hopelessly at last, and within the next two or three years we look for such a settling down of rental valuations as will place a comfortable home within easy reach of the man of moderate means. The prostration of business which is now extending into its third year has infused the spirit of economy, under the hard rule of necessity, into all classes; and landlords must make up their minds to respect this spirit, or suffer the penalty of disrepect.

MR. WILLIAM LITTLE having been suddenly called away to Canada, we are without the statistics promised in last issue of THE RECORD on the lumber supply, which omission, however, will be supplied next week.

LOWER PRICES.

All the signs of the times indicate that work must be hereafter done in this country for a smaller compensation than heretofore. The laboring classes are learning a severe but salutary lesson; they find that they must do more work for less money and that they must do better and more honest work. One of the scandals of our civilization is the lack of honesty among the working classes. Laborers under a system of stern supervision are compelled to do rather more than their share of the hard work, but mechanics are slack and indolent, especially those who go out for day's work, such as house-painters, plumbers, repairers of buildings, who are too often drunken, sloven, dishonest and untrustworthy. But the same law applies to great railroad corporations, insurance companies, and all who transact public business; all these must consent to work for less than they secured during more prosperous times. There is no sense in the Central Road paying eight per cent. to its stockholders, nor in insurance companies paying ten and twelve per cent. "per annum," nor will any of the combinations, either of laborers, mechanics or coal companies, succeed in keeping up extravagant rates for any work performed. Lower wages, smaller profits on investments, lower rates of interest for use of money, smaller returns for rentals—such is the prospect of the future, and all classes of the community would do well to recognize this fact and try to adjust their expectation to a more reasonable compensation, both for their services and for their investments.

REFEREES' FEES IN FORECLOSURE CASES

NEW YORK, June 4, 1876.

Editor Real Estate Record:

DEAR SIR: Will you have the kindness to inform me through your valuable paper whether a referee under a judgment of foreclosure and sale of mortgaged premises can determine the amount of his fees; and if not, whether the fees are fixed by law.

Unless the parties agree upon the compensation of the referee, he has no right arbitrarily to fix his fees or compensation, and the owner of the equity of redemption or other person interested may compel him to have his bill taxed before the Court in which the foreclosure action is brought. The referee is entitled only to the same amount of fees allowed by law to a sheriff for a similar duty.

This question has been passed upon by the Supreme Court, General Term, in the case of Innes vs. Purcell, vol 2, Sup. Ct. Rep., p. 538. In this case the referee claimed one hundred dollars as compensation on a foreclosure sale, which was allowed at a Special Term of the Supreme Court. From this decision an appeal was taken, and Judge Daniels, in delivering the opinion of the Court, says:

By the Judiciary Act of 1847, among other things, it was enacted that, after the first Monday of July of that year, sheriffs should sell any lands in their respective counties ordered to be sold by decree of any court of record in this State, and give conveyances thereof in the same manner, and with like effect, as was done by a Master in Chancery, and for that service it was provided further, that, in addition to his disbursements, he should be entitled to receive therefor the same fees as upon sales by virtue of an execution; but the same should in no case exceed ten dollars (3 R. S., 5th ed., 261, § 49). * * *

While this act limits the fees to the amount of ten dollars, it may well be doubted whether the restriction to that amount excluded the right to commissions previously provided for by the Revised Statutes, for the restriction of the fees would not necessarily exclude the right to the commissions allowed to be awarded in the discretion of the Court to an amount not exceeding twenty dollars. * * * When the power was conferred under which a

referee could be appointed by the Court to make the sale instead of the sheriff, no provision was made declaring what fees he should be entitled to receive for the performance of the service.

The Court, in conclusion, holds that the fees of a referee in such cases should be taxed at the same rate as the statute allows the sheriff for the performance of the same services, viz., ten dollars and an additional allowance in the discretion of the Court not exceeding twenty dollars.

In 1869 (Laws of 1869, chap. 569) a law was enacted directing all sales of real estate in New York City, except sales in cases of partition, to be made by the sheriff, and fixing his fees on such sales at about \$35; but the Court of Appeals held this act to be invalid (Gaskin vs. Meek, 42 N. Y., p. 186).

An amendment to the act of 1869 was subsequently passed (Laws of 1874, chap. 192), authorizing sales of real estate in the City of New York to be made by the sheriff, or by a referee appointed for that purpose. It was further provided by said amendment that at any sale made by a referee no greater sum should be charged as compensation than as allowed by the act of 1869. The original act having been declared invalid, the amendment in our judgment is also nugatory, and, until further legislation on the subject, the fees of referees in foreclosure sales must be regulated by the doctrine laid down in Judge Daniel's decision.

MARKET REVIEW.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

The habitudes of Pine street were considerably exercised during the early part of the week when the "Six Per Cent. Mortgage" article of the Record of the third instant had been thoroughly digested. There was another "howl" on the part of those who ought to have been better posted as to the state of the market, and a "row" by those who are at all times excited whenever the REAL ESTATE RECORD prints in cold, unvarnished type the truth, and nothing but the truth, about the real estate market and the bond and mortgage business so closely allied to it. By this time it has been fully ascertained that money in bulk can be had at six per cent., and at even less in cases where the security justifies it. Money is cheap in this market, and a little more energy on the part of borrowers will enable them to find all the money they want at the figure stated, without being compelled to rely upon the interference of certain "favored brokers" to get them the amounts.

At the Raynor Estate on Tuesday last was stripped of all the "ifs" and "buts"—a success considering the times. The executrix sold all she wanted to sell, the attendance was encouraging, and the bidding animated. It always will be so when no harsh terms are imposed upon buyers. The sooner those in charge of estates make up their minds to face the situation, the better it will be for the property under their control, unless indeed they believe in continuing to pay interest on property which will not bring the amount of the mortgages when sold under the hammer. The eminent bankers who recently managed the Phillips sale might take a lesson from last Tuesday's auction; but perhaps they have some loophole by which to get out, unknown at present to those connected with the real estate market. It is proper here to state that the office of the Raynor Estate is at 1,300 Broadway, where all the property not disposed of last Tuesday is up for private sale.

The Church of the Disciples, after many adjournments, was sold at last on Thursday for \$4,000 over a mortgage and interest of \$100,000, to Mr. Peleg Hall, a gentleman and a churchman, said to represent the second mortgagees.

At private sale we hear that Mr. Bernard Smyth has sold the four-story brown stone front house and lot, 25x100, No. 17 East 48th street, for \$75,000.

We take pleasure, during this warm weather, to call the attention of our merchants to the advertisement of Richard V. BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

BRICK.—Business on hard brick keeps moving, and sometimes develops into a show of quite a little animation, but still fails to give full encouragement to the trade. There is a want of snap and vim to the movements of buyers and a very decided tendency to suddenly withdraw just when it was supposed that operations were about running up into something like respectable proportions again. It does not appear to be a matter of cost or any difficulty experienced in making selections, but simply the fact that not until brick are wanted for immediate consumption are they called for, and having secured such quantity as will carry them along for a few days, jobbers, contractors or whatever the buyers may be withdraw and remain quiet until absolute necessity again compels them to handle another small amount, and this is continually repeated. A comparatively slow, dragging trade results, and sellers gain little opportunity to obtain an advance. Throughout the week now under review the tone of the market has been heavy and prices lower all around. A great many buildings are under way and requiring supplies, but, as noted above, consumers only took in such lots as they required for the time being, and the demand failed to swell into very encouraging proportions. For a time a few receivers attempted to hold prices, but finding themselves constantly cut under resolved upon the same policy, and this of course tended to still further give buyers an advantage. Manufacturers are grumbling, and some already commence to talk about stopping production, on the plea of an absence of margins. On Haverstraw stock some of the extra makes are held at \$6, but \$5@5.50 are the general selling figures, and good stock has changed hands at \$5.25 per M. For "Up-river" about \$4.50@5. per M are quoted for top rates. Pales have sold to about the average proportion, but are also easier and not quotable above \$2.25@2.50 per M. Fronts without change on cost so far as reported, and some fair orders are said to be under consideration. We quote: Pale, per M, \$2.25@2.50; Hards, Up-river, \$4.50@5; Haverstraw Bay, \$5@6; Fronts, Croton—brown, \$10; dark, \$11; red, \$12; Philadelphia, \$23@27; Baltimore, \$34@38. Yard prices, delivery included, \$2@3 higher on ordinary, and \$5@6 on fronts.

CEMENT.—According to the reports of many of the agents everything remains lovely on the market for Rosedale. Sales are said to be making right up to the amounts offering, with sometimes orders ahead, and prices are quoted as fully sustained at former figures. This is all very well so far as it goes, but when the greatly diminished production is taken into consideration, sales equal to the supply, or even in excess, do not in reality amount to much, and the market is not much if any better off than on other styles of material. A shipping outlet to be sure affords a sort of vent, but this does not seem to be as free and promising as hoped for, and the local consumption is certainly slack. We are not so sure either that prices are fully sustained, and while still quoting nominally at \$1.10 on "Creek," and \$1.20 per bbl, here, the hints of some dealers lead us to believe that some of the outside brands have been selling a little off. Foreign has been in limited demand, and without particularly new features. Most recent arrivals have again gone into the hands of consumers, or to jobbers on previous contract, and exporters have little to offer. They say, however, they wanted none, and there does not appear much chance for fresh sales at present. We quote from pier and yard and according to brand, as follows: Portland, \$3.50@4.25; Roman, \$3.50@5; Keene, \$8@8.50 for coarse, and \$12@12.50 for fine; Martin's, \$7@7.50 for coarse, and \$11@11.50 for fine; La Forge, Portland, \$1.10@4.25; and Lime of Teii, \$2.85@3....

GLASS.—French window continues to meet with a spasmodic, erratic sort of demand, which gives the market a slightly feverish tone. Some dealers are confident and strong in their talk, as they may happen to secure a good run of trade for a few days, and their neighbors, whose customers are not at hand, will be found grumbling. Then comes the change about, those who were doing nothing suddenly finding salesbook filling up, while the others experience a sharp falling off in business and become despondent. The total sales are fair, but if more evenly distributed among the trade would give matters a healthier tone. About former rates ruling, and we continue to quote at 60 and 20@60 and 25 per cent. discount. English is quiet and steady. American is in very fair sort of demand from the country, and prices may be called about steady. Some dealers are endeavoring to get an advance, but others are opposed on the belief that an addition to cost would check a great many orders or reduce them to much smaller limits.

HARDWARE.—Business keeps well within the narrow limits previously noted, and the market retains a pretty dull tone. Dealers do not expect any decided increase in the general distribution until fall, and are even doubtful about that in view of recent experience. As a rule prices are about as before, but the fight between the screw manufacturers goes on, and this tends to benefit the buyer. The American Screw Co. recently issued the following list to the home trade: Flat head ironwood screws, 60 per cent. from American; list; stove bolts, 50 do.; tire bolts, best quality, 80 do.; iron, black, iron, tinned, and block and carriage rivets, 65 do.; rivets in bulk, 50 do.; coach screws, 50 do. Terms, cash within thirty days from date of invoice. For export trade—Flat head ironwood screws, 60 per cent. dis. from Canada Screw Co.'s list; stove bolts, 50 per cent. dis. from American list; tire bolts, best quality, 80 do.; iron, black, iron, tinned, and block and carriage rivets, 65 do.; rivets in bulk, 50 do.; coach screws, 50 do. Terms, cash within thirty days from date of invoice. Following the

LATH.—The weakness on this market to which we have referred for some little time past has finally made itself very decidedly apparent, and values show quite a break. Aside from this, we cannot discover that there is really anything new. The reduction on cost has not stimulated demand at all, the purchases made being only where jobbers and consumers could not help it, and even in some cases we hear of dealers borrowing and lending among themselves for temporary necessities in order to keep the demand off the wholesale market. Indeed, receivers have just about as hard work as ever to handle their consignments satisfactorily, and the main object is still to keep the offering within as narrow compass as possible. Manufacturers lend their assistance by shipping cautiously, but there is always more or less stock likely to "boil over" from various points, and this now and then makes an accumulation which carries our market down. The latest sale we hear of to present writing was at \$1.50 per M, but the feeling appeared to be heavy at this figure.

LIME.—Matters do not improve greatly, and the colored individual who is concealed in the fence on this market, keeps the position in a doubtful, feverish sort of condition. Prices have gone lower since our last, that is certain, or rather sellers now acknowledge the acceptance of lower rates, which may in reality have been current in a quiet way for weeks, but beyond this there is apparently no possibility of obtaining any reliable information. Receivers "can't tell" (?) whether the feeling is steadier or the demand any better at the decline, and most of the dealers who have become owners of stocks of late do not appear to be altogether satisfied that they have struck a bargain, and won't tell what they know about it. One thing, however, is very evident, the entire position is nominal just now, and no fixed market rate can be named, while the safety of buyers would appear to be to stick closely to the hand-to-mouth policy, and bid low. It is claimed that ruinous rates will compel all the kilns to shut down, and that we shall soon be without lime altogether. Terrible prospect! But only to those who have not heard this same story repeated for years. As near as we can get at it common has sold at 65c. for North River, and 75c. for Rockland, and the probabilities are lower. Finishing is considerably mixed up, but will range anywhere from \$1.25 down to \$1, according to brand, condition, quality, etc.

LUMBER.—It is just about the same old story over and over again, and we find it a most decidedly unthankful task to attempt giving our readers a weekly market report containing a single item of news. In a few instances of late orders from near-by points which depend to a considerable extent upon this city for their supplies have come in a little more freely, but have not proven continuous, and in no case could buyers be induced to operate beyond previous calculations, the hand-to-mouth policy showing itself here as well as on all other outlets. For city use not many fresh purchases are making, though some specifications ordered early in the season are commencing to arrive and going into the hands of consumers. We hear of no important sales made of late for export, but understand that shippers have received a few unimportant discretionary orders on which they are looking around, but appear to be very low on their ideas of cost, and quite nice in the selection of quality. Stocks are not increasing to any extent and some holders have only a broken assortment to offer, yet there has been no trouble thus far experienced in satisfactorily meeting all calls made.

Eastern spruce has continued to arrive in rather limited quantities, but still receivers seem to have had all the stock they wanted, and with a slow, uncertain demand the market developed no very encouraging features. Manufacturers have managed thus far this spring to ship so as to prevent any very heavy accumulation, but wholesale dealers show signs of fear that something of the kind will take place, and are not inclined to allow cargoes to remain on hand unsold. This produces an irregular sort of position for values, and prices are in reality merely nominal. Taking the extreme range on randoms we should quote at \$12.00@14.50, which would, under ordinary circumstances, bring a good average run of sizes at about \$13.25@14.00, but this calculation cannot, under existing circumstances, be depended upon, as offering not finding a ready market are very apt to be forced off for what they will bring, without much regard to their quality. Randoms are not much called for, and could be negotiated on a basis of about \$14.50@15.00 per M, possibly \$15.50 would be asked for extra difficult, though with mills now generally ready to resume work and for orders at hand sellers would not be exacting.

White pine has been quiet on shipping account, though the rumored orders referred to above are supposed to cover this quality. For consumption the

movement has been confined to the ordinary local and near-by orders, and the offering fully balanced all calls both as to quantity and assortment, while prices were not objected to. Buyers, however, could not be influenced to handle one stick in excess of known wants, and having operated to the extent of previously closely calculated list, at once withdrew. We hear of no new arrivals of Western as yet, the receipts since the opening of navigation coming most from "up the river." We quote at \$20 per M for shippers, 10 inch and upwards, \$17@18 do. for do., 10 and 12 inch; and \$15@16 per box, 8 and 12 inch. Building timber, \$25@30.

Yellow pine continues to present a decidedly poor market for random cargoes, and receivers listen with fear and trembling to any intimation that such are likely to come forward. As yet, however, there has been no offering of this class of stock. For special cargoes the demand is not very active, and somewhat uncertain, but now and then a fairish sort of sale is consummated. We understand that recently a few contracts have been forwarded for dry sidings, and also, to a limited extent, for well-seasoned step-plank, two-inch plank and flooring boards, but only as a matter of keeping up assortment by some of our dealers. Specials arrive moderately, without many additional orders going out, and values nominally unchanged. We quote random cargoes at \$18@20 per M; ordered cargoes, \$21@25 do.; green flooring boards, \$23 do.; and dry do., \$25 do.; step plank, as step plank, at \$24@25 per M. Cargoes at the South, \$14@16 per M.

Hardwoods continue quiet on all qualities and the general market in a most decidedly tame and flat condition, both on the consumptive and shipping outlets. We understand, however, that some interior holders are sending black-walnut abroad through neighboring markets. We quote: Wholesome value by car load, at about \$75@80 per M for the finest walnut; \$50@60 do. for common do.; \$35@40 do. for ash; \$38@40 do. for white-wood; \$35@38 for oak, and \$55@65 for cherry; \$55@65 for butternut, and \$35@40 for hickory.

At the yards matters are in the same irregular state. One dealer will report a fair trade and express satisfaction with the business of the week, while probably his next neighbor will be found suffering from a decided fit of the "blues" over the very limited call made upon his stock. The general distribution, however, has not fallen off, and in some cases deliveries are commencing to a moderate extent on contracts for building purposes. Prices remain about as before, the figures at present named being somewhat nominal, owing to the many contingencies governing sales, but desirable buyers may be considered as having all the advantage.

Among the recent lumber charters we find the following: A Br. brig, 281 tons, to the Western Islands, white pine lumber, \$9 gold; an Am. brig, 250 tons, to Jamaica, white pine lumber, \$4.50, and general cargo, 40c. per bbl, gold, and back with logwood, \$4 currency; an Am. brig, 223 tons, to Jamaica, white pine lumber, \$4 37½; a schr., 260 M. lumber, from Brunswick to New York, \$6; two, 180 and 200 M do., from Jacksonville to New York, \$7; one, 260 M do., from a Gulf port to Philadelphia, \$8, New York, \$9, or a Sound port, \$9.50; one, 125 M do., from Savannah to New York, \$6.25; one, 239 tons, from Savannah to New York, hewn timber, \$7.

General Lumber Notes.

—The Bay City *Lumberman's Gazette* gives its regular weekly comments as follows, under date of 1st inst.:

The past has been rather a quiet week in this market, so far as the extent of purchases or the number of buyers was concerned, while yet the trade has been fair, and a reasonable number of buyers have been looking around. The fact that the stock of dry lumber has been pretty nearly picked up in the market, and that purchasers have to confine themselves principally to new cut, is no doubt the cause of the quietude. That the trade is not by any means stagnant is no less proved by the shipments for the week, which in the item of lumber alone aggregate 17,250,000 feet, as will be seen by our regular report in another column, but as well by the fact that good judges claim that from one-third to one-half the new stock has already been contracted for. While asserting that the dry stock is nearly exhausted, we would not be understood as saying that none could be got, as we hear of small lots being picked up at decided bargains, and know that there are more to be had. One little lot of 50 M was sold the past week at \$8 straight, which had been upon the yard three years, and was sold to get it out of sight, which on shipment proved to be nearly one-half "picks" and uppers. A good many such lots, too small in quantity to attract much attention from large buyers, may yet be found, while one or two large and desirable lots could be found. Buyers visiting the market have almost universally complimented the *Gazette* for its faithful review of the market and condition of matters generally, finding that things were fully as we had represented them. The prevailing feeling is that while we may not look forward to a brisk summer business, the fall trade is to be one of great activity, and while the era of heavy speculation will not soon be revived in the lumber trade, that this season will prove the last of the extraordinary depression. Prices in this valley will probably not during the summer, decline from the present rates, while this conviction is as firmly rooted as at present. An examination of our market reports will show that in the main this conviction prevails in other localities, and while depression is the present cry, it is in nearly every report supplemented with figures showing increased sales and shipments. Shingles are more brisk and in better inquiry, and a doubt begins to be expressed at Tonawanda and elsewhere as to where the usual stock of logs for shingles is to be obtained; we look for a speedy advance, or, at least, a lively demand for this article. Freights are duller than ever, and vessels are laying up, rather than run in debt—a wise precaution on the part of owners, who can better afford to charter than to incur expenses. On the whole, the lumber business of this section may be called fairly prosperous, viewed

in the light of the near past, and while concessions on prevailing quotations are predicted, we can see no good reason for the conclusion; on the contrary, good lots of lumber will bring \$5.50, \$11 and \$33 in our opinion throughout the season. Per contra, coarser lots running light to pickings can be had at \$5@10, and no doubt these figures will be shaded in certain cases. We hear of a sale of 275 M during the week at \$5.10@30, the lot being from logs sawed to deal, from which of course all the best of the timber had been taken, leaving the sidings and coarse, all making the sale fully equal to \$5.50@11@33 if the deals be added to the count.

Circumstances should be, but too seldom are, considered in giving reports of sales. We hear of, but are not permitted to quote particulars, one sale of 500 M feet at \$6, \$12 and \$35. Buyers coming on to the market frequently prefer the higher priced lumber to the lower, and find it the cheapest. Our quotations in the market report are designed simply to give an index of operations, each sale being surrounded with conditions peculiar to itself, which cannot be elaborated in print, but must be seen to be appreciated. Our readers will in general appreciate this matter.

The *Gazette's* regular weekly market reports are as follows:

BAY CITY, Thursday, June 1, 1876.—Our weekly comments give our views of the market and its condition so fully that we need not elaborate in this column. Among the sales of the week we learn of one by Murphy, Avery & Co., 1,000,000 feet to Hubbell, O'Connor & Brown, Cleveland, \$5.50, \$11 and \$32; A. T. Bliss & Co., to same, quantity indefinite, at \$5, \$10 and \$28; A. Rust & Co., to Albany parties, 600 M at \$5.50, \$11 and \$30; ——— to Albany parties, a cargo at \$6, \$12@35; Gates & Foy to Tonawanda parties, 200 M at \$5.50, \$11 and \$32; Chapman & LaForge to same, 300 M at \$5.50, \$11 and \$30; ———, 275 M (deals cut out), to same, \$5, \$10 and \$30. We incidentally learn of a sale of which we have no particulars, further than that it was of 1,000,000 feet to Albany at \$5, \$10 and \$30.

CHICAGO, May 31, 1876.—About 40 cargoes were put upon the market on Monday, and half that number sold. Little improvement was manifested, save in attendance. Prices all around were not maintained. No. 1 piece stuff was a little more firm, and a little more discrimination was shown in favor of fine stock. This is one indication of returning animation. Cargo buyers from the country are beginning to nose around, and the indications for a more healthy demand for the future are fair, but at unsatisfactory prices. The demand in the Southwest this season will doubt that of last. The extension of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad to Pueblo, Cal., has opened up a very fine and rapidly developing country to trade, all of which will be supplied from the Mississippi River. The trade of Kansas will more than double this season, as she has wanted little lumber for two years on account of short crops, and her crops now being fine, and the country bare of stocks, will make a fine demand, and an opening to place the immense stocks of Wisconsin and Minnesota. But a long haul from the Mississippi River will require thorough drying and strict economy in grades.

TONAWANDA, May 27, 1876.—There has not been much improvement in trade worthy of note during the past week. But very few buyers in the market. Canal freights to Albany and New York have fallen to \$2.65 and \$3.65 respectively.

We draw upon the correspondence of the *Northwestern Lumberman* for the following letter from Glen's Falls, New York, written at the close of last month :

The season of 1876 has just fairly opened, and activity in the sawing and shipping of lumber is the order of the day. The strange and unusual winter was very unpropitious for logging, although the latter part was fully severe enough to stave for the exceeding mildness of the commencement and mid-winter portions, and of the few lumbermen engaged in the business here, most of them succeed in banking the greater portion of their logs. The drives near by have generally done well, and are now mostly in or nearly so, but of those at a distance it is impossible to state; the probabilities are that they are "hung up" until a summer or fall freshet, and that will not be sufficient to get them into the great reservoir until another spring. The Hudson River boom contains as near as can be estimated—not far from 1,300,000 pieces, or about 130,000,000 feet of logs, which will no doubt be increased to about 150,000,000 feet during the summer, less the amount that will be discharged from the boom for the purpose of stocking the mills below. The spring freshet has lingered along into the "lap of summer" so far that the season is fully three weeks behind the usual time for opening, which, with the good pitch of water and fresh energies of the men, means considerable. The docks have been entirely bare, and yet the cry from Albany has been for lumber.

One advantage has been derived from the late season, and that is the closing out of accumulated unsalable stock, and the yards will commence business clear of rubbish.

It may not be clearly understood that the Hudson River, which means Glen's Falls and vicinity, furnishes by far the greater portion of coarse lumber for the Eastern market, and to a much greater extent will this be true this coming season than in former years, since parties who have been engaged extensively in the lumber business in the Black River country, in St. Lawrence and other counties, but who with many in this vicinity succumbed to the hard times, have either entirely gone out of the business or have very much contracted their production.

The stock on hand was never so short since the business has assumed its present proportions as at the present time, and the demand is ahead of the supply, or of what it can be for several weeks to come. Although the prices have not advanced since the opening of trade, the manufacturers and dealers are somewhat cheerful under the fact that, contrary to the past two or three seasons,

they are not compelled to solicit trade at prices exceedingly fluctuating, and at all times downward, but the demand is urgent and ruling figures firm. Spruce lumber opens and remains about as it closed last season, which was a trifle higher than would average the whole season through, while hemlock has fallen off somewhat since the opening, which was at last year's price. The present prices range about as follows delivered in Albany:

From the present outlook the above prices will advance rather than decline, as there is no stock on hand to commence with, and the number of firms largely engaged in the production has materially decreased. At present the canal here is full of boats waiting for lumber to be sawed so they can load.

—We clip the following additional items from the *Lumberman*:

A correspondent in Bangor, Me., has kindly furnished us the following information in regard to the lumber business of that city: The total amount of lumber now on the stocks in the city and vicinity is placed at 8,000,000 feet, of which about two-thirds is pine and the remainder spruce and hemlock boards. In this market lumber is rafted and shipped almost as fast as it is run from the mills—none going on the wharves except boards, and these not in any large quantity; hence the stock held in the city at any one time is not a fair index of the amount of business done. The country around Bangor and along the Penobscot River has been visited this spring with very heavy rains, which have caused the river to rise to the highest point known for six years. The freshet resulted in considerable damage to many of the mills and compelled them all to shut down; but at the time our correspondent's letter was written (May 22) the water was slowly receding, and it was expected that in a few days they would be able to resume operations. The principal damage reported was to the Union Mills at Orono, owned by Messrs. Gilman & Webster, which were carried away by the flood and totally destroyed. Their loss is estimated at \$8,000.

At all the Mississippi River markets business seems discouragingly dull and lifeless. At Dubuque, Ia., but little lumber has been sold afloat, buyers in nearly every instance refusing to give last year's prices. No. 1 Chippewa, standard grades, is held at \$12 afloat. A lot consisting of 260,000 feet of fair Wisconsin River stock was sold last week at \$10.25, which is \$2.25 under the rates obtained last season for the same kind of lumber.

It is estimated that 25,000,000 feet of spruce timber will be run down from North Stratford, N. H., this spring.

—The *Hinesville (Ga.) Gazette* asks: "Why is it that so much of the timber now carried to market is classed as refuse? In Savannah at least one-third is declared refuse, and in Darien it is not much better. Many rafts that are carried to market are equally divided—one-half pronounced good and the other half refuse. The timber is not worse than it used to be, nor is less pains taken in getting it up. This is working a heavy loss upon the cutters, for it costs them as much to get this refuse timber to market as any. The secret lies in this: Nearly all of this refuse timber is trimmed and sold as first-class. Many buyers assert that they make more money on the refuse timber than on the good."

It will be seen from the above quotations that the prices of scab timber have declined some since our last issue; but all that is brought to market is sold without any trouble. The demand for square timber is not very good, though the prices remain about the same. Scab timber has been selling very readily this week, and we think the demand will continue very good for several weeks to come.—*Timber Gazette*.

—From the *London Timber Trades Journal* of May 27 we obtain the following:

LONDON, May 26, 1876.—In commercial matters generally there is an atmosphere of depression from one extreme of the country to the other, but its effects are hardly felt as yet in that branch of commerce with which we are chiefly concerned. It is impossible for us, however, to shut our eyes to the fact that there exists a feeling of this kind, though as yet almost imperceptible throughout the wood trade. We observe nothing unhealthy in the present tone of the market; for certain classes of timber there exists a very fair demand, for others the inquiry is not so good, while the fresh importations up to date do not more than fill up the gap caused by the winter consumption; under these circumstances, we should be inclined to speak more favorably of trade for this year, but in connection with other things among them, and most important too, is the great increase of our importations from America as well as

the Continent, without a corresponding increase in our chief exports. This falling off, England being a purely manufacturing country, must affect the existing state of things sooner or later; hence we are hardly as hopeful as we should otherwise be of prices of timber being sustained during the season. We must not, however, draw too strong an inference therefrom that the prices are going to topple down "topsy turvy," as some are inclined to believe. In the meantime there is an absence of the speculating element. Money seems locked up, and those in whose hands it is have no desire to put it into circulation while prices continue so undecided. There is evidently more disposition on the part of the foreign shippers to make concessions, or rather to adapt themselves to the views of the merchants on this side.

By American advices we understand that a great trade is expected this year with England, and 1876 is to be an improvement on that of the past season; but considering the low price of American wood here, we cannot agree with our cousins the other side of the Atlantic. The market for pitch pine, as well as other descriptions, during the present dulness, will not bear any pressure; and, as the speculation going on is of very limited character, American shippers must confine their operations to meeting the legitimate demand only, otherwise pitch pine will become still more depressed in value. The exercise of this caution is applicable to all the timber ports, both north and south.

LIVERPOOL, May 25, 1876.—Our business remains in a somewhat dull state, and partakes of a character which, generally speaking, cannot be satisfactory to importers or merchants, as prices still rule low for nearly all kinds of timber. Yet the consumption continues large, and with the exception of pitch pine and birch the stocks are very moderate. The stock of pitch pine has increased rapidly, several cargoes having been stored by the importers, but these have been chiefly old and weathered wood which failed to meet with buyers when put upon the market. We may here remark that this season's shipments of hewn pitch pine timber, when of new cuttings, show a vast improvement in manufacture, and this is most noticeable in the Pensacola shipments which are now sent to market, well squared and nearly parallel-sided, in contrast to the old shipments of uneven-sided, long, tapering timber, which usually had a quantity of rough, knotty top wood, of little or no use to the consumer, but who now cannot fail to appreciate the efforts of the present cutters to send the timber in good form, and suitable for economical conversion. The stock of birch has been increased by excessive shipments of timber cut down with the intent of supplying our market when the late high prices were ruling, but the inflation having given way, owing to so much being thrown on the market, stocks, as said before, are accumulating, but are generally of good, sound, fresh wood. Spruce deals remain much in the same condition as before, and sales have been made only by retail from the dealer's yard, or when in the cargo, at prices not allowed to transpire. Prepared flooring is easier in price, but it may now be considered as having probably touched its lowest price. There is little doing in Canadian hardwoods, such as elm, ash, etc., but a large proportion of a parcel of round hickory was sold by auction at 3s. and upwards per foot.

—The *Toronto Globe's* Quebec correspondent says: There is no demand for lumber for the United States. The quantity of saw logs to be manufactured in this neighborhood will be very much less than usual. Many mills will only cut half time, and as the principal portion of these logs will be as usual sawn into deals for the English market, the quantity of small lumber manufactured will be very considerably less than in previous years. The stocks of last year's lumber held over are large. The local demand is very limited.

METALS.—COPPER.—Ingot continues in rather light demand, and holders are somewhat disappointed. Offerings of stock are made as small as possible, but there is more than enough for all calls, and prices are weak. We quote at 20½@20¾ for Lake. Manufactured is selling slowly but at steady rates for all grades. We quote: Yellow metal sheathing, 20@21c.; do. bolts, 28@29c.; nails, 21@22c.; braziers' copper, ordinary sizes, over 16oz. per square foot, 32c.; sheathing copper, over 12oz. per square foot, 36c.; bolt copper, 32c.; old copper, 16@20c., as to quality. IRON.—Scotch pig iron is quite limited demand and somewhat nominal, but in a jobbing way worth probably \$28@31 as to brand and delivery. American pig not very active and still unsettled, though the leading brands are held at outside figures. Forge irons are scarce. We quote: No. 1, \$22@23 per ton; No. 2, \$20@21 per ton; forge, \$18@19 do.; and mottled and white, \$16@18. Bars selling fairly but not actively, with no decided change in cost. Old rails dull. We quote at \$43@45 per ton for new 56lb iron; steel rails, \$65@66 per ton; street rails, \$47@49 per ton of 50lb and upward, and \$70@75 for steel; old rails at \$21@23 per ton. Scrap iron dull at \$27@30 for No. 1 wrought. Manufactured iron is in light demand. LEAD.—Foreign is quiet, with a fair stock offering at 6½c. gold for ordinary grade. Domestic in moderate demand, but the stock small and holders steady. We quote at 6½@6¾c. gold. The manufacture of lead steadily. Bar, 8¾c.; pipe, 9¾c.; sheet, 10c., less the usual trade discount. TIN.—Pig is held about as before, but the demand is moderate and the few buyers in attendance seem to be expecting a decline. We quote: Straits, 18½@18¾c.; English L and F, 17½@17¾c.; English gold, 17½@18c. Tin plates have sold with greater freedom, and a good trade is expected to continue, as the canning season for fruits is now setting in. Spelter is held by the combination at 80c., but outside lots are offered at 7½@7¾c. currency. Zinc remains about steady at 8½@8¾c. gold. The following table shows the total production of iron for 1875 as compared with that of

1874, compiled by the American Iron and Steel Association:

The decrease in the production of pig-iron was all in anthracite and charcoal pig-iron, the rebeing a slight increase in bituminous and coke. The stock of unsold pig-iron at the end of the year was 760,908 tons. The total value of imports of iron and steel during the year was \$15,273,315, a decrease of \$9,327,405 from that of 1874.

NAILS.—At the advance recently noted manufacturers and holders generally are quite firm, and the offerings are moderate. The demand, however, appears to be checked by the addition to cost, and we hear of very little business doing beyond the usual inquiry from jobbing dealers to keep up assortments. The production of cut-nails and spikes in 1875 was 4,726,881 kegs, against 4,912,180 kegs during 1874. We quote: 10d. to 6d., common fence and sheathing, $\frac{1}{2}$ keg, \$3.10; 8d. and 9d., common do., $\frac{1}{2}$ keg, \$3.35; 6d. and 7d., common, $\frac{1}{2}$ keg, \$3.60; 4d. and 5d., common do., $\frac{1}{2}$ keg, \$3.85; 3d. and 4d., light, $\frac{1}{2}$ keg, \$4.60; 3d., fine, $\frac{1}{2}$ keg, \$5.35; 2d., $\frac{1}{2}$ keg, \$5.35. Cut spikes, all sizes, \$3.35. Floor, casing and box, 75c. above the same sizes of common. Finishing \$1 above, and fine finishing \$1.25 above.

CLINCH NAILS.

OILS.—Values continue to shrink away somewhat on many styles, and we find no encouragement on the general market. Stocks are full, considering the prevailing light demand, and nearly all holders are anxious to realize. Linseed, about 56@57c. per gallon; lard, 65@80c. for No. 1, and 87 $\frac{1}{2}$ @95c. for winter made; olive, \$1.18@1.23; crude cotton seed, 40@42c.; and refined summer yellow do., 50@52c.

PAINTS.—Among the importers the complaint is quite general that trade rules very dull. Jobbers, however, appear to keep up a fair sort of distribution, and are obtaining about former rates on leading styles of goods. We hear of a few sales, including vermilion at 79 $\frac{1}{2}$ @80c., gold, for quicksilver; Venetian red at \$1.85@1.90 for Cookson's; Paris green at 18@28c., according to brand; ochre at 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ c., gold, for French; white lead at 12@12 $\frac{1}{2}$ c., currency, for B. B. ground; China clay at \$17.50@21, gold; terra alba at \$1.30 for English, and Western glue at 9@35c., according to quality. We quote: Sandpaper (B. A. & Co.'s list), flint No. 00 to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ and assorted, per ream, \$5; do. Nos. 5, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 3, \$4.50; star, all numbers, \$3@1.25; emery paper, No. 00 to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ and assorted, \$6@6.50; No. 2, \$7.50; No. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$, \$9.50; No. 3, \$11@11.50.

PITCH.—Business has continued dull throughout, and dealers found it difficult to move even ordinary job lots. Supplies ample and about former rates ruling. We quote at \$1.95@2.12 $\frac{1}{2}$ for city delivered.

PLASTER PARIS.—The season may now be considered fairly opened, but thus far dealers have not been encouraged by any very great amount of business, nor does the outlook promise much of a brilliant nature. Bluerock has been entirely neglected, and has only a nominal value; but for white the cargo rate is about \$3 per ton for good quality. There has been some sold in part to city manufacturers, in part for Newburgh, etc., and part for Southern shipment; but the aggregate business was far below the average for the season, and there is no indication that buyers are likely to become more plenty. In fact, the hand-to-mouth policy of handling goods prevails here as well as on all other articles of merchandise, and is adhered to with much tenacity. Calcined plaster is irregular, both as to price and movement. Some dealers report a good, steady business, with fair shipping orders, while others complain of the dull state of trade, with few outlets for stock offered beyond an ordinary jobbing distribution. Prices vary, too, according to size of invoice, brand, quality, etc.; but \$1 50@2.50 per bbl. will probably about cover both extremes for city brands, though from out of town sources we understand that offerings are made \$1.25, and attract some attention.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—Sales have been made at lower rates, the supply is pretty full, and owners are comparatively willing operators. At current cost, however, there is not much inclination to force business until the market has had a fair test. We quote at 29 $\frac{1}{2}$ @30c. for Southern, and 31@31 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. for New Yorks, with small lots at 33@34c.

TAR.—The demand has been fair for small lots, and with the supply under pretty good control, and no free additions expected, holders are steady in their views. We quote at \$2@2.20 for Newbern and Washington, and \$2.10@2.25 for Wilmington.
