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MARKET REVIEW.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

The revival of trade among business men generally, as reported in these columns last week, still continues, and will soon lead to renewed confidence in New York City real estate. Of course, it takes time, and considerable time, too, before the market can feel the effect of it, but the long period of gloom is beginning to fade away, and the future is looked to not with buoyancy, but with a confidence which is encouraging. The wholesale business community of New York, not only those in the drygoods trade, but also in several other lines of business, are more than satisfied with the trade New York has done during the month of August, now at an end. Large sales have been effected, and that, too, upon terms quite agreeable to the sellers, long credits having in numerous instances been discarded. So far as the revival of trade generally is concerned, everything is working well, but, in order to keep it so, and in order to retain for our city that reputation, and consequently for our city's real estate that value which they have maintained in the past, it is important that the movement recently inaugurated by some of our merchants to procure better railroad and hotel facilities should succeed. New York must look to its laurels. Other cities are working energetically so as to catch the trade that is still with us. They offer inducements in the shape of lower rates for freights and lower rates at hotels, items of great importance to Southern and Western merchants, even if the goods they are after can be bought at a trifling less here than in Baltimore, Boston or Philadelphia. Property holders who are not benefiting yet by the revival of trade, will find that co-operation with merchants now, just at the beginning of a new era of activity will benefit their real estate ultimately, because they, the property holders, are the principal parties who will gain or lose ultimately by either the increase or decrease of commerce in our midst. A merchant, if he does not do well here, can move to another town. A property holder cannot. He must remain here, as he cannot take his property with him. A little more public spirit then, a little more energy on the part of property holders will aid New York not only in retaining the trade it possesses to-day, but in increasing it ten-fold.

BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

BRICK.—The demand does not increase for any description, and the market, as a whole, remains in a very dull condition. Hard bricks have realized about former rates, but extreme figures were reached with difficulty, and, if any thing, buyers had more advantage than last week. Indeed, \$5 1/2 M for Haverstraw is the exception rather than the rule, and a great many sold at \$4.75 down to \$4.12 1/4@4.25, while "Up-River" brought only \$3.75. Pale brick are quoted about as before, as a lower figure would entail a loss, but there is scarcely enough doing to fix a value, and figures, in reality, are only nominal. The receipts, considering the wants of the market, have been full, and the production continues about the same, as for sometime past, we understand, but one of our principal receivers assures us that a more general stoppage of work is pretty sure to take place during the present month. Fronts of all kinds are quiet in proportion to the apathy in the market for commons, and prices remain nominally unchanged. We quote: Pale, #3 M, \$2.25@2.75; hards, Up-River, \$3.75@4.25; Haverstraw bay, \$4@5; fronts, Croton-brown, \$10; dark, \$11; red, \$12; Philadelphia, \$23@27; Baltimore, \$34@38. Hard prices, delivery included, \$2@3, higher on ordinary, and \$5@6 on fronts.

GLASS.—French window glass has been in fair and rather improving demand, and the market, on the whole, is somewhat more cheerful. Supplies and assortments balance the call, however, and about former rates are, as a rule, accepted. We quote at 60 and 20@60 and 25 per cent discount. American selling very well, and is called firm, though occasionally some dealers indulge in a little cutting under to secure good orders. English glass unchanged.

HARDWARE.—The demand is not remarkably active, and buyers still refuse to make up any very large invoices, but taken all in all, trade is very good and dealers appear satisfied. On most leading styles

prices rule steady. A new hinge has been introduced called the Centennial Spring Hinge, intended for doors of hotels, churches, depots and other buildings where constant use demands the best possible materials and construction.

The manufacturers say :

It has two flat coil springs, very powerful. It has a heavy solid pintal, giving much less friction than a hollow pintal.

It has broad solid bearings in the knuckle, which do not wear down readily and let the door sag. It is fast joint, and can be used for either right or left hand, allowing the dealer to carry less stock, and the builder will never get the wrong hand. It is convenient to put on or take off the tension. By actual test it has an average of 50 per cent more power than other spring hinges, in common use, of same size.

The Union Chain and Cable Company are quoting chain as follows: 5.16, 7 1/4c.; 3/8, 6 1/2c.; 7-16, 6c.; 1/2, 5 1/2c.; 9-16, 5c.; 3/8, 4 1/2c. Net cash in 30 days. Free on board cars in Pittsburgh.

LATH.—There does not appear to be any really new general features in this market since our last. Up to the present writing the amount available has been small, and quite a number of dealers were in want of stock, a position which gave sellers the advantage, and induced a pretty firm holding out for \$1.50 1/2 M. The demand, however, can neither be considered free or improving, and much of an addition to the amount of supplies offering would make a surplus.

LIME.—'Tis the same old story in this market. The demand from all quarters continues moderate, the supplies are regulated to the wants of trade, and about former prices retained, but receivers and business generally in a very unsatisfactory condition. At both the eastward and in this State the number of kilns running is unusually small, and there is no inducement to materially increase the production at present. We quote nominally as follows: Rockland, 85c. per bbl. for common, and \$1.25 for finishing; North River, 60@65c. per bbl. for common, and \$1.25 for finishing.

LUMBER.—Business on the wholesale market continues to move moderately, and that is about all. The shipping demand requires nothing beyond the parcels sent out to fill freight room or an occasional small special order: local calls, although now and then swelling to a fair aggregate, are not continuous or of sufficient magnitude to make any serious inroad upon stocks; while dependent domestic points seem to be consuming very sparingly, and seldom find it necessary to send in orders to replenish stock. All our dealers, however, are using great care about purchasing or ordering forward additional supplies, and there is not much pressure upon the market, except from interior manufacturers, who now and then make an effort to convince the trade of the safety of investment in lumber. These efforts do not appear to be greatly appreciated, or, at least, are not acted upon to any extent. In the midst of the dull business, however, we find some of the principal dealers again nurturing a hope of a larger and more general movement during the incoming Fall, and hail this, at least, one cheerful sign. Especially, as having gone through the test of a remarkably protracted period of depression, values have, in all probability, reached the limit of shrinkage, and more likely to improve than to further favor buyers.

Eastern spruce has continued to arrive moderately, yet, on the whole, there has been sufficient for the limited demand, and sellers gain no advantage—in fact, it is evident that it requires the most careful management on the part of agents and their consignors to prevent too great an accumulation, and a very little surplus would undoubtedly cause much inconvenience. In some instances, there has recently been a slight increase of special orders, but with buyers positively refusing to exceed former figures. We quote at \$11@\$12.50 for random, possibly \$12 for choice lengths, in small cargo; and \$12.50@\$14.50 for specials, the extreme for extra difficult.

White Pine not quite so active, but, in some cases, a fair distribution is being made, and the market may be called about steady. Home consumptive wants afford the best outlet, few of the exporters having any orders at present. The arrivals are limited, but exceed the outlet, if any thing, and the stock slightly increases. On the general range about former prices are reported as current. We quote nominally at \$18 @19 1/2 M for shippers, 10 inch and upwards; \$15@17 do. for do., 10 and 12 inch, and \$13.50@15 for box, 8 and 12 inch. Building timber, \$30@35.

Yellow pine remained steady at about former rates, and agents generally are unwilling to contract ahead, except at a pretty full margin, as this is a precarious

season regarding freight room. The demand, however, is by no means of a stimulating character and is confined, in the main, to specials. We quote random cargoes at \$18@20 P.M.; ordered cargoes, \$21@25 do.; green flooring boards, \$24@25 do.; and dry do., \$25.50@27; step-plank, as step-plank, at \$24@27 P.M. Cargoes at the South, \$15@16 P.M.

Hard woods are dull and sluggish, with a more or less nominal range of values for all grades. We hear that a few black walnut logs find a foreign demand from parts to the southward—rate not named—but here there is still an absence of market for them. We quote: Wholesale value by car-load at about \$70@7.50 P.M. for the finest walnut: \$35@60 do. for common do.; \$35@40 do. for ash: \$38@40 do. for white-wood: \$35@35 for oak, and \$55@65 for cherry: \$50@65 for butternut, and \$35@40 for hickory.

The yard dealers are distributing about as much as last week, and in the usual manner, buyers knowing just what they require before coming forward, and refusing to operate beyond. Values are nominally unchanged, but are by no means regular, and we find dealers views so widely at variance that we adopt what appears nearest the general asking rates, from which desirable customers can frequently gain fair concessions. Supplies and assortments are equal to all present calls, but we commence to notice here and there a depletion of stock, and it may be a crumb of comfort to interior holders to know that in case a good fall trade should spring up a great many of our dealers will undoubtedly have to buy pretty freely. It is quite as sure, however, that, unless the call does improve, very small amounts will be brought into winter cover.

Among the recent lumber charters we notice the following: A br. barque, 758 tons, hence to London or Glasgow, deals, 95s.; 1 br. ship, 1,128 tons, hence to London, deals, 90s.; a s.schr., 190 M lumber, from St. Mary's to Port Spain, Trinidad, \$10 gold; one, 200 M hewn timber and resawed for stowage, \$8@7, respectively; one, 175 M resawed lumber, from Cedar Keys to New York, \$9.25; one, 170 M do., from Jacksonville to New York, \$7; two s.schr., 180 and 250 resawed lumber, from Cedar Keys to New York, \$9.25; one, 185 M do., from Jacksonville to New York, \$7; one, 180 M do., from St. Mary's River to New York, \$6.75; one, 130 M do., from Port Royal to New York, \$6.75.

Jos. M. Wright & Co.'s latest mail advices from Rio Janeiro report:

Pitch pine deals are also depreciated in value, our dealers holding large stocks in the absence of any demand for building purposes. Sales are reported of 160 M feet ex "Clotilde," from Pensacola (River Plate assortment), at \$30\$50 and 263 M feet, ex "Hector," and 300 M feet, ex "M. V. Hugg," both from Brunswick, \$22\$60 per doz. 3x9x14, the cargo per "C. Mc. Gilvery" being on order. Receipts, 1,172,738 feet.

White pine lumber—Sales have been to a considerable extent at the extremes of 85—95 rs. per foot, but the trade is now well supplied, and the market closes flat. Receipts, 800,032 feet.

The following items from a Western paper refer to the shipment of deals, for which we have recently reported charters:

The shipment of deals to England has grown into considerable importance at Muskegon, Mich., and given lumber a healthier tone. They bring \$28 per thousand in gold, and are delivered by rail on the Jersey City docks for \$6, which is less than they can be carried for water.

The Chicago and Michigan Lake Shore railroad are shipping about fifteen cars per day, loaded with deals, over their road to Grand Rapids, Mich., from whence they are carried to Jersey City without breaking bulk, and reshipped to Europe.

General Lumber Notes.

The *Lumberman's Gazette* contains the following:

BAY CITY, Wednesday, Aug. 23, 1876.

The attendance of buyers upon this market is gradually on the increase, and advices given from principals to agents by letter and otherwise indicate that trade is quietly picking up from all quarters, though nothing remarkably brisk has yet been experienced. Buyers generally are exercising the utmost caution in negotiating for only such amounts as they are morally certain will be needed to meet the calls of their customers. There is a strong inclination to hold off before buying, to effectually test the feeling among producers, and no occasion is lost to buy a little cheaper than prevailing quotations, if possible. As a rule, the manufacturers who are well-heeled, as the saying is, display their characteristic grit in maintaining prices, while those who are getting rather closely pushed incline to shade somewhat to buyers with cash in hand, or for first-class paper at 30 and 60 days.

Stocks are now getting to be in a very fair condition for shipping, and, as a whole, the qualities are turning out better than did the product from last year's logs. In some few cases a little difficulty has been experienced in preventing lumber from weather-coloring, occasioned by the damp and somewhat changeable condition of the atmosphere.

As to the prospects for a late fall trade, much difference of opinion prevails. Sellers, as a rule, are hopeful, or, at least, talk so; while buyers have strong doubts, or, at least, express themselves so while away from home—of course, there may be method in both of these colorings, and we give them for what they are worth. Still we are inclined to think that the West is much more hopeful than the East, the former relying much upon the bountiful harvests and the prospects of advancing new building schemes on this account, while the latter are fearful that but little new work will be done in many of the cities where large supplies have been consumed in the past, from the fact that hundreds of business houses and dwellings stand unoccupied, waiting for tenants at even

low rentals, thus offering no encouragement to landlords and speculators. But there is some comfort in the fact that trade is better now at the majority of our distributing points than it has been for some weeks past, thus bespeaking something for the future.

There is less demand for uppers than has ever been known before, and a consequent desire to shade them. During the past two or three years many shoddy buildings have been put up in all of the large cities, and the result of this policy is now being felt in a depreciation of the finer qualities of lumber. Manufacturers look for relief in this particular through the deal trade, in a measure, and the probabilities are that more will cater to this foreign demand another year, without there should be a healthier feeling among consumers relative to the use of uppers.

Work at the mills is moving on smoothly, though several are getting near the beginning of the end of their season's run. The logs are rapidly being consumed, and it is thought that everything available will be cut before shutting down time comes. Still there will be lumber enough upon the docks to satisfy the majority of owners, as many of them are quite heavily stocked at the present time.

Freights are about the same, though rates on grain have advanced a trifle, and some are of opinion that tariffs on lumber will go up a notch ere long.

Prices range all the way from p. t. to \$5.10-28-\$5.25-10, 50-30 and \$6.12-32-33 and 34, according to quality of stocks, shrewdness of buyer or confidence of seller in the future prospects or trade. Quite a large amount of lumber has also been sold during the week, though it has been rather difficult to get at reliable quotable figures.

Among the actual sales we note the following: 960,000 prime stock, for various Eastern markets, at \$6.12-34; 300,000 nice common for Buffalo, at \$5.50-11.30; 300,000 mil run to same market, part at \$5.10-30, and remainder at \$5.25-10.50-30; 150,000 for Chicago, and 150,000 for Toledo at same figures; 100,000 piece bill stuff for Ohio, at \$8; 50,000 fair quality shipping culs for Ohio at \$6; 280,000 for Eastern market at \$5.25-10.50-30; 100,000 for New York at \$5.10-30; 3,250,000 for the Eastern trade at \$5.25-10.50-30; 300,000 for same at \$5.25-10.50-28; 700,000, market unknown, \$5.25-10.50-30.

The *Gazette's* Buffalo correspondence of the 19th says: Only an average business has been done during the week. Country buyers have not been numerous, and had they been, wholesale dealers generally have not had a variety of stock to sell them. In fact, the assortment of cargo lots is very meagre, with very little dry enough to be tempting, even if the quality were desirable. One or two good sales come to our notice. A cargo about two months out, 360 M feet, running 14 per cent, to uppers, with a good show of 12-inch stocks, brought \$8.14-35; another not so desirable, but a fair sorting lot was sold at \$8.14-34.

Then again we learn of sales of inferior lots at our lowest cargo quotations; one of these last, however, was a sale made by a barge owner who made no profit on the lumber, except, perhaps, to get an additional 25 cents upon his freight. The wholesale trade is injured by these petty transactions, more largely in shingles and lath, and while perhaps vessel owners cannot be censured for taking this means of filling out their freight list, yet it is a serious detriment to the trade, and, in the end, reacts upon the vessel owner.

The *Gazette* also has the following:

As to the stock of lumber and timber on hand in New York City, says our informant, "It is one of those things that no fellow can find out," without much trouble and expense, and I have learned that time and labor expended in this and similar directions meet with no reward." When will there be a change for the better in this respect? Conundrum. We give it up.

It is one of those things no two or three fellows can find out. We have made the effort at various times for several years, and especially so January 1st last, and have also endeavored to obtain some reliable data as to receipts, but found it simply impossible to collate figures, calculated to prove of benefit to the trade.

The *Northwestern Lumberman* reports as follows:

Chicago, Aug. 24, 1876.—The wholesale market for the last three days is said to have been as lifeless as at any time this season, though the inactivity has resulted more from a want of cargoes to sell than from a lack of buyers to take them. The receipts for sales afloat have been small, which has enabled the operators to keep the docks pretty well cleared, and this morning they have succeeded in working the available stock down to one cargo. The attendance of country buyers has been larger than usual the past week, and a number of orders have been taken for lumber to arrive. Commission men regard the prospect as brighter, and continue to hope that the reaction they have been looking for is not far distant. An attempt has been made to advance the freight rates, but we understand that no change has yet been effected.

As to prices, good piece stuff is in demand at \$7.50 @7.75, and for common to fair \$7.25 is obtained. Good boards and strips are steady at \$10.50 to \$14.50, with common to fair do. ranging from \$8 to \$10. Lath are quoted at \$1.15, and shingles \$2@2.25.

A city journal, in a recently published article on slate, has the following:

"All the Pennsylvania slate is black or dark blue, and so also is that of Maine and Virginia; that from Vermont is red, purple and green. The slate from Bangor, and what is called the Peachbottom, from Pennsylvania, bring the highest prices; the former is worth \$8 a square; the latter \$10 a square. The next highest is that of the Bangor Slate Company, Pennsylvania, which is worth \$6 to \$6.50 a square. The Franklin or Williamson Lehigh slate is worth \$5.50 to \$6 a square. Some slate has streaks running diagonally across it, known as the Chapman slate, from Northampton County; it is worth \$5 to \$5.50 a square. The unfading green and the purple from Vermont are worth \$8 a square, and the red \$12, but very little of this, however, is used, as it is exclusively for ornamenting. We depended almost altogether upon the English quarries for slate for many years, but as the production of the American quarries increased, of course the imports decreased in proportion. For eighteen years past scarcely any has been imported at New York, but England still supplies some of the Southern ports, and a small quantity is received in Boston every year. The exports of slate were very trifling for three or four years past. Small quantities of the green Vermont have been shipped to London and other European ports. Since January last there has been an increase of exportation, but probably they have not exceeded three or four thousand tons. It is thought likely, however, that they will increase. It is only the toughest kind of slate that is fit to export, as the material is exceedingly brittle. It is only certain sizes, too, that find a market in Europe, such as are not made there, so that the export trade is not like to be large. Neither is it very profitable, for the prices obtained leave little margin for profit. If there was a large demand here for the article, exporting would soon be stopped, it is said; but the supply at present far exceeds the demand."

A GUESSING ANIMAL.—The typical Yankee is a guessing animal. Give him but the nine digits and ciphers enough and he will attempt to parcel anything off into integral amounts. He would have no hesitancy about guessing at the length of an imaginary belt line, or of notating in the incorruptible monum-ent of figures the contents of an unexplored world. were he only fortunate enough to have one to practice upon. This in fact is his stronghold to such an extent that he can hardly throw two consecutive sentences together without sandwiching them with about as many "I guesses." Strong as this propensity is, however, on general principles, he is never quite so much at home as when estimating the probable amount of standing timber there is in any given section. There seems to be something about such a task that inspires him beyond all others of a similar nature. Here, as whim or caprice may dictate, he can throw together rows of 000,000,00, etc., like beads upon a squaw's necklace, or contract them as a dead cashier would when attempting to balance the debit side of his ledger. We have upon our table, at the present writing, computations, or rater guesses, upon wooded regions. From these take, for instance, the Menominee River country. One of our modern Keplers, of "sound judgment and undoubted authority," of course, sets his figures at a little over 3,000,000,000 (a foot or so perhaps), and stands ready to risk his geometrical reputation upon their accuracy. No one would have thought of questioning the computation for a moment were it not for the fact that Kepler No. 2 comes equally commended in the qualities of judgment, authority and the like prerequisites so necessary for a good guesser, and declares the standing pine upon the self-same stumps to be but little short of 12,000,000,000 feet—four times the estimate of Kepler No. 1, which to we outsiders looks a good deal like making the "narrative" wag the canine with a vengeance. Still this is only one of the huge jokes which have been perpetrated upon the credulous citizen; and the most remarkable of all is, many of these stupendous blunders have been thrust upon us by self-styled wiseheads, endowed with some professorship and handles upon both ends of their names. Yet if the Yankee is justly styled the champion guesser, our worthy Canadian friend Mr. Little is worthy to be called the "boss deductor," for he appears to have brought order out of the motley array of American guesses, and deduced the fact that they don't amount to much as far as accuracy is concerned. In his little pamphlet he has completely turned the tables on the "low order of guessers" by proving to them from their own statements that the timber in this vast northwestern region, for instance, will be exhausted within the next six years, thus showing that they have shot under the mark "by a large majority." Only a few rules of Euclid were necessary to prove to the most unobserving woodsmen that such estimates are too small by at least a dozen years. Now that our worthy friend has so effectively squelched one faction of our Yankee guessers by showing the absurdity of their computations, if he would confer another benefit of equal magnitude, he should as effectually clip the wings of the "high fliers" by showing the foolishness of their statements. Thus, by knowing the extremes—the minimum and maximum periods allotted for the run of our timber supplies—the more ordinary ones might be able to strike a line somewhere near the mean, which would enable them to tell within an hour or so when to begin shutting down the mills for want of

logs. The mathematician who will bestow such a favor upon his fellow lumbermen is worthy of respect second only to the imaginary man who will make two blades of grass grow where there formerly was but one—and it is agreed to call him a benefactor of his race. There is no doubt but that we are coming down from "an inexhaustible supply of timber" to 0 with deplorable rapidity, but if our Yankee figures show that zero will be reached in about six years, we can only say so much the worse for the figures, for such is not the case, luckily for this country. Still the spoliation is going on at a dangerous rate, and on the principle that an extreme is often valuable to show the strength of an argument, let us profit by the figures, guesses and computations which have been given us, even though they are somewhat hyperbolic, remembering that to be forewarned is to be forearmed.

METALS.—COPPER.—Ingot moderately active, with an irregular tone in values, but no great amount of strength shown. We quote at 18@19c. for lake. Manufactured is dull beyond an ordinary trade demand, with values nominally as before. We quote: Yellow metal sheathing, 20@21c.; do. bolts, 28@29c.; nails, 21@22c.; braziers' copper, ordinary sizes, over 16 oz., per square foot, 32c.; sheathing copper over 12oz., per square foot, 36c.; bolt copper, 32c.; copper, 16@20c., as to quality. Iron.—Scotch pig is not wanted in a wholesale way, and sells in jobbing lots very slowly, with prices weak. We quote at 37@39 per ton, according to brand. American pig finds about the usual small outlet; there is plenty offering, and prices still favor buyers. We quote: No. 1, \$32@33 per ton; No. 2, \$29@31 per ton; forge, \$18@19 do.; and mottled and white, \$16@18. Rails meet with a light demand, and manufacturers views do not harden. We quote at \$13@15 per ton for new 56lb iron; steel rails, \$65@66 per ton; steel rails, \$47@49 per ton of 50lb and upward, and \$70@75 for steel; old rails at \$21@22 per ton. Scrap iron dull at \$22@30 for No. 1 wrought. Manufactured iron is still quite dull. LEAD.—Foreign is dull, with prices rather heavy, and quotations down to 63@65c. gold. Domestic also lower, and values close unsettled. We quote at 7@7½c., currency. The manufacturers of lead steady. Bar, 8½c.; pipe, 9½c.; and sheet, 10c., less the usual trade discount. TIN.—Pig is becoming scarce again, holders of the stock placing a favorable construction on advices from abroad. We quote: Straits, 17@17½c.; English L and F, 16½@17c.; English refined, 17½@17¾c.; and Banca, 21@21½c., all gold. Tin plates meet with a slightly better demand, and the tendency of values, if anything, is upward. Speiter selling slowly and rather weak in price at 7½c. currency. Zinc moderately active and steady at 8½@8¾c. gold, for foreign; and 9@9½c., currency, for domestic.

PAINTS.—There is a fair local demand and a pretty good jobbing distribution to the interior, with prices ruling about steady. As a rule, most manufacturers and importers too are doing a somewhat better business, but nothing beyond the capacity of their stocks to satisfy. Sales reported since our last are unimportant, embracing only ordinary lots of white lead at 10½@10¾c. gold for B. B. ground. Paris white, \$1.80 gold. Oxide zinc, 8½@11c. gold, as to brand. Vermilion at 67@69c. gold for English. Venetian red, 2c. gold for crown brilliant. China clay at \$18.50 gold for English, and glue at 11½@15c. for domestic. We quote: Sandpaper (B. A. & Co.'s list), flint, No. 00 to 1½, and assorted, per ream, \$4.25; do. Nos. 2, 2½ and 3, \$4.75; star, all numbers, \$36@35; emery paper, No. 00 to 1½, and assorted, \$6@6.50; No. 2, \$7.50; No. 2½, \$9.50; No. 3, \$11.50.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—Occasionally some little activity occurs on export account, but the majority of buyers for home use are cautious and indisposed to operate beyond positively known wants. The offering of stock is small and sellers retain the advantage. We quote at 30@30½c. for Southern, and 31@31½c. for New York, with small lots at 32@33c.

ALBANY LUMBER MARKET.

[From the *Argus* of August 30, 1876.]

There is not any variation in prices of lumber to report. There has been an absence of large dealers from the District, and, as a consequence, but little stir. The receipts for the week ending the 22d inst. were large, and they have been free since that day; stocks are consequently gaining on the trade, who now hold good assortments and at prices favoring buyers. Prices will, no doubt, hold as they are now ruling until we have an advance in freights. The Western (Michigan) markets for pine lumber hold firm, in consequence of a steady drain therefrom on Ohio and the manufacture of deals for the English market. From Canada we have nothing that is new.

The continued drouth at the North checks the manufacture of coarse lumber; stocks in the District are ample for the demands of the trade, and prices are firmly held.

The receipts at Oswego for the week were 8,000,500 feet, with \$2 per M freight by canal to Albany.

The receipts at Buffalo for the week were 3,775,200 feet by lake; by rail, 32 cars are reported. Canal freights to Albany, \$2.55@2.75 per M feet on pine, and \$3.25@3.50 on hard wood.
