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MARKET REVIEW.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

Real Estate operators and brokers, having just now but little business of their own to attend to, are taking a most intense interest in that of their neighbors, and daily eagerly and anxiously question their mercantile friends as to how general business is doing, understanding as they do, that any improvement in Real Estate must be foreshadowed by the general prosperity of the business community. So far as this is concerned, all is now going well, and there is no possible doubt but that New York is just now doing a lively and comparatively profitable trade, one which in times like 1873 would have served as basis for a general advance in prices and would have created a most lively speculative time. New York merchants have, however, since that year, received many bitter lessons, which those who are now left are profiting by, and we consequently find them loth to kill the goose that lays the golden eggs, by any advance in prices which the purchasing public will not stand.

There seems to be but little of interest occurring in the Real Estate market, the same listless tone still characterizing the transactions of the Exchange Sales Room, all of which are of a purely legal character. There is no diminution in the number of foreclosure suits, the number filed for August of this year being slightly in excess of the same month for the year 1875, the actual figures being 162 for the year 1875, and 180 for the year 1876. In July of this year there were 213 suits filed and but 137 in the same month of 1875. There seems to be also a slightly less proportion of suits stayed off this year than last, as mortgagees are insisting upon positive settlements, which owing to the weakness of the holders can only be consummated by the sale of the property, which almost invariably falls into the hands of the plaintiff.

BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

BRICK.—The market for common hards has, if possible, been in a worse condition than ever, and we find receivers grumbling very much over the situation. Some demand prevailed, of course, but it was of a cautious indifferent character, and, in no case could buyers be persuaded to handle stock in excess of the known necessities of the hour. Receipts, in the meantime, have continued full, with the supply afloat frequently showing an uncomfortable accumulation, with no other course to pursue but to carry the stock until chance afforded an opportunity to dispose of it. Values naturally, under the circumstances, have lacked strength generally, and are

somewhat under last week, standing at about \$3.50@ 4 for "Up-River, and \$3.75@4.50 for Haverstraw, with possibly here and there a dealer willing to pay \$4.75@ 21.300 to obtain a special make, but the latter figures are above the rates obtainable for the general run of stock. Advices from the river seem to show that manufacturers continue work in the face of the condition of the market, and that few who have stopped did not do so until their storage accommodation was full to overflowing. Pale brick are not very plenty and remain at about former figures nominally, but to sell them any lower would probably cut off all margin. Fronts in slow, uncertain demand, with about former rates asked on most grades. We quote: Pale, p. M., \$2.25@2.75; hards, Up-River. \$3.50@4; Haverstraw, \$3.75@4.50; fronts, Croton-brown, \$10; dark, \$11; red, \$12; Philadelphia, \$23 @2; Baltimore, \$24@3. Hard prices, delivery included, \$2@3, higher on ordinary, and \$3@6 on fronts.

CEMENT.—Rosendale does not meet with much demand on local account, beyond the ordinary orders from regular sources, out dealers preferring to adhere to the hand to mouth policy. Manufacturers and agents, however, think they can discover premonitory movements among buyers on shipping account looking to an increase of demand, and it is likely the call for winter supplies may soon set in from some quarters. The production continues to be gauged as closely to the wants of the market as possible, and with a fair amount of success, but no scarcity has been shown, and all orders are promptly met at former rates. We quote at \$1.10 on "Creek," and \$1.20 here. Foreign styles too attract a trifle more attention, and all the leading brands rule about steady, with no scarcity, however, and importers in position to order out additional amounts should they be required. We quote from pier and yard and according to brand, as follows: Portland, \$3.40@4; Roman, \$3.50@4; Keene, \$7.75@8 for coarse, and \$11.75@12 for fine; Martin's, \$7.67@25 for coarse, and \$11@11.25 for fine; La Forge, Portland, \$4.10@4.25; and Lime of Teil, \$2.85@3.

FOREIGN WOODS.—There has been a somewhat increased distribution of cabinet woods from yard, as manufacturers are doing a trifle more work in part for stock and in part on orders. There was nothing like positive activity, however, and the influence is not felt upon the wholesale market, which remains quite dull. Supplies in first hands are small, but no more wanted, and values, to some extent, continue nominal. At a recent public sale rosewood, averaging about 760 lbs to log sold at 5c. per lb all around; saimwood, 22c per foot; and Circassian walnut burls at 13@20c. per lb, averaging a trifle over 16c. per lb.

GLASS.—The demand for French window glass has been very good, especially from buyers direct, the number of customers in town proving larger than for sometime past. They have found all the stock wanted, both as regards quantity and assortment, and obtained it at former rates, but the tone is firm, and some holders talk of an advance. Quotations at 60 and 20@60 and 25 per cent discount. American glass firm also, with a good and increasing call for all the regular sizes. For English the inquiry a little irregular, though, on the whole, fair.

HARDWARE.—The week has been a comparatively quiet one, and not altogether satisfactory. A great many buyers were in town, but they appeared to have little to do beyond looking around, and purchases were nearly all of the jobbing character. Promises were made of increased orders by mail, but out dealers would have preferred something more tangible. The position is about steady for all classes of goods, and since our last we hear of no important changes made. The American Screw Company announce a discount of 70 per cent. from Philadelphia list on tire bolts.

LATH.—Sellers have had the advantage since our last, and this, of course, means an addition to values. Receipts were moderate and arrived in good form to handle easily, and with a demand sufficient to exhaust the offering about as fast as made, buyers gradually increased their bids, in order to secure what they required. Up to the present writing, the highest rate we have actually heard of as being paid is \$1.65 per M., but there still appears to be an unsatisfied demand, and receivers express an intention of running the rate up to \$1.75 per M.

LIME.—There is no radical change in this market, but, if anything, the turn is just a trifle for the

better. The weather is in more favorable condition for carrying stock, dealers commence to make rather more inquiries, and it looks as though the demand would soon show slight animation. Eastern is quite scarce, with not much immediately expected, and though up to present writing no change has been made, receivers are talking of advancing the cost. On State there has been a slight advance, 65c. now being as low as any of the agents are willing to sell, and they report the outlet as somewhat in excess of the immediately available supply. We quote nominally as follows : Rockland, 85c. per bbl. for common, and \$1.25 for finishing; North River, 65c. per bbl. for common, and \$1@1.25 for finishing.

LUMBER.—Some few exports have been made on direct orders to both West Indies and South America, it is said, but the foreign demand is, by no means, general, nor does it promise an increase. Home wants are apparently about as small and uncertain as ever, and the hopes of increased fall trade have certainly not as yet commenced to develop themselves. In short, the general market is just about as dull and stupid as ever, and the situation may be summed up into the commercial reporters' epitomization, "dull and nominally unchanged."

Eastern spruce has arrived with a little more freedom, and now and then there appeared to be a surplus in the market, but many of the cargoes were specials, and the pressure of offerings was not great. Manufacturers are shipping slowly, in order to prevent an over-loading of our market, but would like to find an outlet for more stock, even at a shading. It is said that the lumber business of Bangor, Me., and vicinity is very dull, more so than has ever been known before. Most of the mills on the Penobscot have shut down for the season and but little lumber is being shipped. A number of what were supposed to be staunch concerns have failed lately, including some of the largest operators in the city. Values here remain nominally as before, but are a little too high for free sales. We quote at \$11@\$12.50 for random, possibly \$13 for choice lengths, in small carloads; and \$12.50@\$14.50 for specials, the extreme for extra difficult.

White pine continues in the even tenor of its way, a few parcels being occasionally taken for shipment, and now and then a fair order coming in on home account. There is no reassuring activity, however, and dealers generally find that rates must be kept quite easy in order to secure customers. We quote nominally at \$18@19 1/2 M for shippers, 10 inch and upwards; \$15@17 do. for do., 10 and 12 inch, and \$13.50@15 for box, 8 and 12 inch. Building timber, \$30@35.

Yellow pine, with scarce and firm freight room, is naturally held with a considerable amount of steadiness, and full former rates are still quoted. The demand, however, keeps along in about the usual light channel, and is confined almost exclusively to orders. We quote random cargoes at \$18@20 1/2 M; ordered cargoes, \$21@25 do.; green flooring boards, \$24@25 do.; and dry do. do., \$25.50@27; step-plank, as steplank, at \$26@27 1/2 M. Cargoes at the South, \$15@16 1/2 M.

Hardwoods are about as quiet as usual, and the market void of new or interesting features. Stocks, under ordinary circumstances, would not be called large, as the effect has been to keep them back in the interior, but there is certainly more than the market can at present take care of. We quote : Wholesale value by car-load at about \$70@72.50 1/2 M for the finest walnut; \$35@40 do. for common do.; \$35@40 do. for ash; \$38@40 do. for white-wood; \$35@38 for oak, and \$35@45 for cherry; \$50@65 for butternut, and \$35@40 for hickory.

At the yards business has been fair; a little better, if anything, but still can hardly be called active, and show buyers operating on the old cautious hand-to-mouth policy. Accumulations are slightly on the increase, if anything.

Among the recent lumber charters we note the following : A br. barque, 714 tons, to Antwerp, black walnut, &c., £1.475@1,500, to lay days; a schr., 315 tons, from Norfolk to Jamaica hogshead, \$11 gold; a brig, 240 M lumber, from Pensacola to New York, \$9. option Providence, \$9.50; a schr., 140 M lumber, from Wilmington to Jacmel, \$10 silver and port charges; one, 157 tons, from Brunswick to Hantsport, N. S., yellow pine timber, \$10 gold; one, 190 tons, from Brunswick to Porto Rico, lumber, \$10 gold; one, 180 M lumber, from Pensacola to New York, \$9.25.

General Lumber Notes.

We have received from G. E. Stockbridge, Secretary, the following :

" You are invited to attend the third annual meeting of the National Association of Lumbermen, to be held in the city of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, commencing on Tuesday, the 19th day of September, 1876.

" The magnitude of the industry; the vast capital employed therein; the constant recurrence of adverse legislation, only to be defeated by concert of action of the entire trade; the paramount importance of correct statistical knowledge; the desirability of national consultation on improved and economical methods of manufacture; the momentous question of supply and demand; and many other objects common to the welfare of the industry, which can only be reached by united effort; the pride which lumbermen take in their trade, demand the continuance, enlargement and strengthening of this association. Those most intimately connected with the executive work of the association, are more than ever convinced of the absolute necessity of this national advisory body, more especially at this time of general and prolonged depression, and cordially in-

vite lumbermen everywhere to attend and lend their wisdom and aid for the common welfare.

" The lumbermen of the Chippewa Valley, the great centre of production of the central Northwest, also earnestly invite you to attend."

Much and lasting benefit can unquestionably be obtained by the entire lumber trade of the country through this association, and it should receive the support of every one interested. Our dealers and, in fact, representatives from all distributive and consumptive markets would be heartily welcomed, and an interchange of views and opinions with producers, no doubt, result in eradicating certain existing evils which many even content to grumble over, without taking steps to secure a remedy.

The regular weekly report of the *Lumberman's Gazette* is as follows :

BAY CITY, Wednesday, Aug. 30, 1876.

Trade is improving. During the past week a healthier feeling has been experienced than for sometime previous. The attendance of buyers is on the increase, while inquiries and orders by mail or through agents are very encouraging. Several familiar faces from Chicago, Cleveland, Tonawanda, Buffalo, Albany and other distributing points are seen in our market, and the best of all is they appear to mean business more now than has been manifest during the greater portion of the summer. We do not mean that there are evidences of any great run or undue gush in sales, but simply that the outlet is favorable for a good fall trade from this out. There is still a considerable financing on prices, but the tendency is rather towards a firmness than otherwise, and the cargoes that go for \$5, \$10, \$20, and below are much less this week than previously.

Sales at most of the distributing markets are becoming more thrifty, owing to the advent of the grain and fruit trade, which promises to be more than ordinarily large for the balance of the year; and, as none of them were carrying large stocks, the result has been sooner felt here than it would otherwise be.

The lumber on dock in the valley is now in excellent condition, for the most part, and with but few exceptions, the lath and shingles on sale are well sawed, selected and packed.

Freights have gone up a notch, vessel owners holding out very strenuously for an advance of 25 cents per thousand, while shippers labor to secure rates as much below that figure as possible. This rise, as was to be expected, has occasioned many a buyer to remark, "Oh, would that I had bought my stock three weeks sooner;" but, as they were earnestly advised to do, so there is no one to blame but themselves. Still, freights have been too unremunerative for the past two months, and our vessel owners are justly entitled to better prices, if the lumber trade will, in any way, warrant it.

Among the sales we note : 500 M, for Buffalo parties, at \$6, \$12, \$23; 1,200 M, mill run for Ohio, at \$5, \$10, \$20; 300 M, fine stock, at \$5.50, \$11, \$20, for Eastern parties; 400 M, average quality, at \$5.25, \$10.50, \$20, market unknown; 500 M, choice stock for the Eastern trade, at \$6, \$12, \$24; 350 M, good common, \$5.25, \$11, \$20, also for Eastern parties; 800 M, mill run, for different markets, at \$5, \$10, \$20; 300 M, for Chicago, at \$5, \$10, \$20; and 1,300 M, fair stock, for Buffalo, part of \$5, \$10, \$20, and the remainder at \$5.25, \$10.50, \$20.

The following is from the *Northwestern Lumberman*:

CHICAGO, Aug. 31, 1876.—The market for lumber afloat during the past week may be characterized as fairly active. Sales have been easily made and the offerings, in most cases, placed very quickly. Actual transactions, however, have been somewhat restricted by the light receipts, and we learn that two or three contracts have been made by buyers wanting particular grades of piece stuff for cargoes to arrive. Prices are firm at the figures quoted, and for some grades a slight advance is claimed, though hardly decided enough to warrant a change in our figures. A sale was reported this morning of a cargo of piece stuff at \$8, but, as it is questionable whether any further sales can be made at that rate, it cannot be regarded as changing the price. It is hoped that the ensuing month will bring a change that will be permanent, though operators have been so often disappointed in their calculations this season that nearly all of them decline to make any further prophecies concerning it.

The receipts for the week reach 35,603,000 feet, which is fully up to the average of this season, though a falling off from last year of nearly 8,000,000 feet. The total receipts to this date are 90,000,000 feet less than for the same time in 1875.

From the London Timber Trades Journal of August 19th we clip the following :

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 17th, 1876.—A slight cessation in the imports has somewhat lessened the crowded state of the docks, although they remain crowded far beyond their capacity, and the quays, canal wharfs and railway stations still continue to be subjected to

great pressure. The limited dock accommodation remains as usual a standing grievance, and it is no uncommon circumstance for vessels even of small size to remain ten to fourteen days before they come on turn for a berth.

With a late season, such as this is, and the long detention here, many ships will not be able to get a second voyage to Canada, and owners are already asking higher freights for "fall" ships, and this, with the probability of a curtailed import, must tend to stiffen prices for autumn shipments.

Spruce deals still continue in good demand at the same unchanged prices as those lately quoted, whilst Quebec yellow pine has been taken to a fair amount.

Pine deals of first and second qualities are in demand, and prices are stiffening, the former being sold in retail at from £23 to £29 per standard, according to specification and brand, and the latter from £15 10s. to £17, but thirds are not much wanted.

All hardwoods are in fair request, but without any marked change in value. Baltic timber and deals remain without animation, and the former is now almost superseded by pitch pine, which can be had much cheaper and of better quality, though in many quarters a prejudice in favor of the former wood still exists.

HULL, Aug. 10, 1876.—The arrivals of timber at this port since our last have been large, which keep the trade very active. The bulk of it appears to be passing inland, as the railway is and the shipowners are busily occupied. The new stocks in the yards do not appear to be gaining on the whole, as the old stocks are being depleted in about the same proportion. The principal firms report a fair amount of trade doing, and there is little complaint about being dull or slack. The late amalgamation of the sawmills with regard to advanced rates for preparing flooring is having a very depressing effect upon that branch of trade, the rates are higher than are paid at other east coast ports, and 30 per cent, above those ruling in Liverpool. The result is, that Hull has had to withdraw from the great Lancashire towns within reach of Liverpool, and other inland towns are drawing their goods from the port in a rough or unmanufactured state, the rates ruling inland only having undergone a change.

GLASGOW, Aug. 16th, 1876.—As will be observed from the Clyde import list in another page, the arrivals of American and Baltic timber and deals have been on a pretty extensive scale, which will amply meet the demands of all consumers.

Since last report the undenoted public sales have been held at Yorkhill Timber Wharf here and at Greenock. The attendance of buyers was very good, and the bidding well maintained. The best timber especially was in fair demand.

Messrs. Singleton, Dunn & Co., held a sale of Quebec pine and lower port spruce deals at Yorkhill Wharf, Glasgow, on Thursday, the 3d inst., when the following rates were realized :

Curls, 4d. to 4/2c., average 4/4d. barely.

METALS.—**COPPER.**—Ingot has continued to sell rather slowly, and, with ample offerings, prices do not gain much strength. We quote at 18 1/4@19c. cash for Lake. Manufactured slow of sale and prices unchanged. ALBANY LUMBER MARKET.

[From the Argus of September 6, 1876.]

Since our last report there has been a good lively trade in the district, with indications, from the steady attendance of buyers, of a continued fair business. Large sales accompanied with free shipments of the lower grades of lumber have been made, covering one lot of two millions of feet to one party. There has been a slight advance in lake freights, with a tendency to a still further improvement; if maintained, its effect will be seen in the advance of prices here. Stocks are ample and well assorted, with light receipts by canal during the last few days—mainly below the free receipts at this time last year. No change in prices is quoted. The firmness and activity of the Western market has its influence here. We notice the sale within a few days of 1,000,000 feet Muskegon mill run at \$14 to arrive, to be forwarded from the Lake Michigan trade, and also a large lot taken by Eastern parties on similar conditions.

Cosine lumber is selling freely; the sales are chiefly of hemlock, the price of boards, though still quoted at 12c., are generally held at 13c. Stocks of all kinds of coarse lumber are fair; the assortment is good. The receipts, owing to continued lack of water at the mills, are light.

The receipts at Oswego for the week were 5,974,000 feet, with \$2 per M freight by canal to Albany.

The receipts at Buffalo for the week were 3,015,000 feet by lake; by rail, 65 cars are reported. Canal freights to Albany, \$2.50@2.75 per M feet on pine, and \$3.25@3.50 on hard wood. During the month of Aug. 186 cars of lumber were received at Buffalo from Lake Shore Railroad.


