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### THE HYGIENICS OF BUILDING.

VI.—*Conclusive.*

**GAS LIGHTING.**—The three sources of danger in a modern dwelling which science is called upon to deal with are the invasion of sewer gas through the house soil pipe, the invasion of coal gas through the furnace flues, and the invasion of illuminating gas through leakages in the gas fittings.

We have already discussed two of these topics and suggested means of prevention. We now come to discuss the third and last one.

The fastidiousness of American taste calls for the burying of gas service pipes out of sight. In France the law compels the builder to place these service pipes on the outside of walls and ceilings without reference to appearances. If the Health Board was aware to what extent the modern dwelling house is subject to the invasion of this poisonous illuminating gas from cracked pipes and broken joints of gas fitting, probably a similar law would be enacted in this State. These fractures and dislocations of joints arise as much from the manner in which they are introduced into buildings as from any chance inferiority of pipe metal used for this purpose. Ordinarily these pipes are suspended from ceilings by hooks attached to the floor beams. These horizontal pipes are connected with vertical supply pipes leading directly from the house meter. Probably no more insecure method of introducing these pipes can be devised than the one now commonly employed. The weights sustained by house beams are unequal and unevenly distributed, and these alone tend to produce the dislocation and cracking of such pipes. To these causes is superadded the certain and unavoidable shrinkage of beams which are often introduced into buildings in a damp if not a green condition. In time they completely give up their moisture through the action of artificial heat and the natural dryness of the atmosphere which surrounds them.

Besides leakage from pipes which are carried over ceilings, under floors and within partitions, there is apt to be considerable leakage about the fixture joints, especially about the faucets which turn on or shut off the illuminating gas. There is no excuse for these leakages of fixtures, provided the householder takes pains to purchase the goods from the best manufacturers and there is certainly no remedy for them except the watchfulness of the housekeeper. It is important that all exposed fixtures should be periodically examined, as even the best made joints are apt to become loose, and the thread of the screw which holds the fixtures to the pipe may corrode and rust. The plug or core of the faucet is also liable to wear away like the core of a croton faucet and should be peri-

odically renewed. All the devices of good workmanship may fail to protect us from possible leakage in the supply pipes themselves. In a very carefully executed job, it might be wise to introduce the gas by means of lead pipe which is more tractable than the ordinary iron pipe, and the joints can be securely and tightly soldered.

Another safe method would be to encase the ordinary iron gas pipe in an outside pipe, say of galvanized iron or cheap lead pipe. The enclosing pipe would act as a container or receiver for any gas which might escape from the service pipe. It would be necessary to provide an outlet for this enclosing or containing pipe into a ventilating flue, or at some one accessible point where the fact of a leakage might be easily discovered. The proper distribution and protection of these gas service pipes is a subject that deserves the attention of sanitarians equally with that of sewer pipes.

Escape of gas often arises from the corrosion or faultiness of the burner tips or nipples, and from the imperfect combustion of the flame. The central dark blue spot that is perceptible in most jets represents uncombusted gas that finds its way into the atmosphere of the dwelling. The lava tip burner with automatic check valve is the latest mechanical improvement in this department. This fixture, coupled with the opal glass globe, with broad flaring bottom, which has been lately introduced, seems to afford the perfection of result in gas lighting, to wit: a bright steady flame of completely combusted gas, the glare being softened by the color and shape of the new globes. Automatic gas lighters are now attracting attention and exhibit meritorious results.

**DISINFECTANTS.**—Probably the commonest ambition in this country, and the subject about which the American intellect is most actively exercised, is to devise some useful and valuable invention by the patent of which the inventor may expect to derive a comfortable fortune. It may be safely said that not more than five or ten out of every five hundred current inventions are of permanent utility. The rest have either an ephemeral value, or fail entirely to satisfy any actual want. We regard as a benefactor of the race any one who exercises his inventive faculty to devise methods and appliances calculated to promote household convenience or healthfulness. There is no field more inviting for such exploits than the human habitation, and certainly none where the efforts of genius might rely upon ampler rewards. We have no terror of inventions and no morbid sensitiveness about alluding to them. Next to the credit of perfecting meritorious inventions, honor belongs to whoever will take pains to find out the honest and useful ones, and give the public the benefit of his experience and research. We intend, as far as our limited opportunities will permit, to inform ourselves upon the efficacy of current inventions in the sphere of building improvements, and from time to time we will give our readers the benefit of our information. We will expressly stipulate that no inventions shall be mentioned in our editorial columns except such as have been thoroughly examined and tried, and then we shall aim to confine our criticisms to those which we consider practical and praiseworthy. We have no fear of taxing the credulity

of our readers, but shall rely upon their intelligent discrimination to rightly estimate the weight and value of such criticisms as we may offer. Unwillingness to test improvements, to be the first to take the new departure will account for much of the stereotyped character of our New York buildings. A more liberal and enlightened spirit is beginning to prevail. Any prudent and painstaking builder or house holder can well afford to run the risk of encountering a few failures in alleged improvements, for the sake of securing one that is of permanent practical benefit. Such notices as we shall offer, it may be proper to say, will be unsolicited, gratuitous and independent.

The special device to which we invite attention at this time, is called a disinfecter, but its title hardly conveys any adequate idea of its method or mechanism. It is designed principally, if not solely, for application to water-closets; and consists of an earthen tank or jar, which holds a disinfecting fluid intended to be automatically injected into the bowl of the closet. It is simply, then, an appliance for introducing disinfecting fluid into water-closets. The advantage of this device is, that it is sure and regular in its operation, delivering into the water-closet pan a fixed quantity of fluid every time the handle of the closet is raised. Such a service is a vast improvement upon the irregular and spasmodic efforts of servants or house-keepers to attend to the disinfection of sinks, by mechanically depositing proper fluids from a hand bowl or pitcher. To be of any lasting and useful service, the operation of disinfecting must be performed with certainty and regularity.

We will endeavor to describe the ingenious contrivance of Mr. Jennings' for accomplishing this important object.

The principle of the apparatus is the well known one in hydraulics of the siphon, and it is thus applied:—A large earthen jar, capable of holding two or three gallons of fluid, is placed upon a shelf about four feet above the closet seat. Through a hole in the bottom of this jar, a glass bulb or vial, about an inch in diameter and holding three ounces of fluid is suspended. The only connection between the vial and the bowl is a small feeder about the size of a quill, through which the fluid passes into the vial. A quarter inch pipe leading from the bowl of the closet pierces the bottom of the jar and cranes over near the top, passing into the glass vial underneath, thus forming a conduit pipe between the vial and the water-closet bowl. Half way between the seat and the jar containing the disinfectant, this conduit pipe is pierced by another pipe connected with the Croton service that supplies the water-closet bowl. The joint is so formed that water passing up this pipe from the service impinges against a plate at this joint and is so forced down into the water-closet bowl through the first-mentioned conduit pipe. After the handle of the water-closet is dropped and the Croton service shut off, the last gush of water that passes through this pipe produces a vacuum of sufficient suction power to draw the charge of disinfecting fluid that is in the glass tube through the conduit pipe, discharging it into the pan of the water-closet bowl. As fast as the vial is emptied, it is promptly supplied from the jar of fluid. The

bull or vial is capable of containing about three ounces of fluid, and the jar is intended to supply one hundred and fifty charges of this quantity, so that when once filled it is likely to last one or two weeks, according to the frequency with which the closet is used. Almost any of the leading disinfectants can be used in this method, although the preference will, in all likelihood, be given to the Bromo-Chloralum or to the Girondin Disinfectant. Either preparation is expressly intended for household use, being inodorous, non-poisonous and non-corrosive, besides being very efficient and quite inexpensive.

This invention, when properly applied, secures, in the most perfect and thorough manner the great desideratum of the proper deodorizing and disinfecting of water-closets. It is the invention of a practical English plumber, and is extensively used in England and Canada. It is working its way gradually into use among our own citizens, and is favorably regarded by the medical profession. It is one among the many devices which are presented to the New York public by Mr. A. G. Myers, at his depot of sanitary plumbing supplies, at 94 Beckman street. The public can find there a disinfecter in practical operation, and will be better able, by examination, to judge of its merits and serviceability than by any verbal description.

Whatever pains may be taken in the arrangement of soil pipes for the exclusion of sewer gas, and for the ventilation of sewer pipes, it is still necessary to bear in mind that the generation of poisonous gasses begins the moment fecal matter is deposited in the trap. Amid the most abundant precautions such gases are likely to find their readiest outlets in the bowl of the closet or in the basin and tub drain pipes when connected with the soil pipe. The only means at our command for combating these gases is the application of disinfectants, and no more efficient or reliable vehicle of application can be devised than Jennings' disinfecter. The accumulation of successive charges of disinfecting fluid in the traps of the soil pipe, and their passage through the soil pipe itself, have the effect to purify the whole drainage system of a house. Its principal service, however, is to purify the closet bowl and the atmosphere of the room in which the closet is placed.

#### THE TAX OFFICE.

It may perhaps be needless, but it is nevertheless expedient, to say that the Tax Office in this city comprises three functions. The Tax Commissioners determine the measure of each taxpayer's indebtedness. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment determine the aggregate of the tax budget. There two functions are separate and independent under the laws although one of the commissioners of taxes also serves as a member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The Receiver of Taxes is the third co-ordinate official, and it is his business to collect the taxes and pay over the proceeds to the Chamberlain of the city.

The Tax Commissioners are vested with the supreme power of determining what portion of each taxpayer's property shall be taken for governmental expenses in any given year. While the tax budget is being made up, citizens at large and the press may be more or less indifferent as to its details, conscious that it will be eventually spread over a very large area of taxable values and apportioned among a large number of individuals. But when the climacteric period arrives of determining the precise measure of each individual's quota of tax, the operation of the tax system then becomes intensely and personally interesting to every taxpayer in the community.

We will endeavor to illustrate by simple tables

the effect upon the individual taxpayer of these two operations, to wit, the making up of the general tax budget and the defining of individual tax indebtedness, in certain hypothetical cases.

These tables are almost too simple to need any exposition. We have assumed in each case that the gross sum of tax valuation remains the same. By a comparison of these tables the reader will perceive the effect of the increase of the tax budget in one case, and the effect of an increase of an individual valuation in the other case. The relative power of inflicting damage upon the taxpayer, as demonstrated in these tables may be thus translated into language: An increase in the general budget of city expenses amounting to \$5,000,000 has the same effect upon each taxpayers indebtedness as does the increasing of his individual valuation from \$10,000 to \$11,666. Conversely stated, when a sub-assessor in valuing property for taxation raises the valuation of a given piece from \$10,000 to \$11,666, he invades the interest or pocket-book of the taxpayer to the same extent as if the city expenses had been increased \$5,000,000.

These illustrations will furnish an adequate idea of the vast power and incomparable responsibility which are vested in the Tax Commissioners, and explain the intense and irrepressible interest which concentrates in their office during the first four months of the year, the period when by law the books of valuation are exposed to public scrutiny.

#### LEGAL DECISIONS.

##### IMPORTANT DECISIONS AFFECTING ASSESSMENTS.

The last General Term decided several assessment cases of interest. In the matter of the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank, application was made to vacate the assessment, amounting to nearly six thousand dollars, on sixty-one lots, between Seventh avenue and the Boulevard, on the grounds of fraud and substantial error, it being alleged that the Commissioner of Public Works was not authorized to pave the street by what is known as days' work, but that a contract therefore was necessary, that the cost of the work was overcharged, and that expenses, not authorized, incurred were included in the assessment. Judge Donohue denied the application at the Special Term, and his order is now affirmed. The Court, Davis, P.J., writing the opinion, holds that assessments, except in cases of repavement, can be vacated only for actual fraud; that the Commissioner of Public Works had power to improve the streets and avenues above Fifty-ninth street either by days' work or by contract, as he might determine, without an ordinance of the Common Council; and that the alleged overcharges could only be inquired into upon certiorari. The total amount affected by this decision is over \$100,000.

In the matter of Thomas H. Walter it was claimed that the assessments exceeded the limitation imposed by the law of 1840, viz., one-half of the value of the property as fixed by the tax commissioners. The assessments were for regulating and grading, and for paving Manhattan street, adjoining which the property is situated, each assessment amounts to one-half the assessed value of the property, and together they are equal to its entire value. The petitioner argued that the

two works, regulating and grading, and paving, constituted but one improvement, and that separate assessments therefor were laid to evade the statute of 1840. Mr. Justice Donohue, at Special Term, denied the application to vacate, and his order is affirmed by the General Term, which holds, Judge Brady writing the opinion, that the assessments are for two distinct and separate improvements, and are in entire accord with the provisions of the act of 1840.—*Register.*

#### THE CLERMONT.

The erection of this apartment house on the northeast corner of Broadway and Fifty-fourth street, shows that there are some owners of property in this city willing and disposed to supply residences in this class of buildings that can be called homes in the true sense of the word. Mr. Edward J. King, though he will reap a good return for his investment, nevertheless does not crowd his tenants in small boxes. Only one suite of rooms is to be found on each floor, and each suite is composed of no less than ten rooms, large in dimensions, and light and airy throughout.

Extending forty-one feet along Broadway and fifty-four feet seven inches along Fifty-fourth street, the Clermont, with a large store on the corner, represents a convenient-looking and ornamental apartment-house. There is room, here, for everybody to move in, as the architects, Messrs. Jardine, have not divided the various spaces at their command, but have parceled out for each tenant enough room to enable each family to occupy a comfortable residence. Within the building, though not pretentious, has a wonderfully cosy appearance, with just room enough for five families, only five flats constituting this latest addition to our apartment buildings. Mr. Robert L. M. Darragh, of 1539 Broadway, has, under the immediate supervision of the Messrs. Jardine, had charge of the mason work and fulfilled his contract to the very letter. The front of Philadelphia brick and Nova Scotia trimmings reflects at once the modest tone, which characterizes the entire building, though the indoor carpenter work, by Mr. Thomas Wilson, of Harlem, with the hardwood trimmings, is fully up to the more elaborate structures of this kind. The hardwood mantels and the mirrors, from Mr. F. Schettler, 245 West Twenty-eighth street, deserve particular commendation, and are superior to those one is wont to meet with on the ordinary flats. The marble work throughout the Clermont has been furnished by Mr. Volkening, 104 West Forty-seventh street, and like all the work which comes from this place, has in this instance, again given satisfaction to both owner and architect. Thomas Aspinwall & Son, who have just opened a new place of business in the upper part of Broadway, have supplied the tiles for the hall, and the selection, judging by the impression they make upon the visitor, has been a very favorable one. The plumbing and gas fitting has been satisfactorily furnished by David Hennessey 1603 Broadway. A peculiar incident in connection with this Clermont building occurred which should be mentioned as a warning to those who like to plume themselves with other peoples' feathers. It appears that some straggling mechanic proffered to supply a Murtaugh dumb-waiter, as called for in the specification at a lower rate than the ordinary article. His offer was accepted, but it so happened that the Murtaugh dumb-waiter put in by the party would not work. In fact the fellow did not understand the business at all and disgusted both Mr. Darragh and Mr. Jardine. They had to send at last for Mr. James Murtaugh himself, and he was the only man who could give satisfaction in placing in proper shape the product of his own handiwork.

All the floors of the Clermont are already occupied with the exception of the ground floor. The private entrance on Fifty-fourth street, is not at all interfered with by the corner store, as ample space is left between the corner and the steps that lead to the apartment house proper. Of course this entrance is ornamented with hard wood doors and embossed glass giving the vestibule a very excellent appearance. When it is added that the entire structure has been erected at cost less than \$30,000, it will be seen by those who still hesitate that now more than ever is the time to improve their real estate.

Messrs. Hall & Nixon, corner Fifty-first street and Broadway, are the agents for this building, and before the Messrs. Jardine surrendered their charge, it was all rented with the exception of one flat.

## MARKET REVIEW.

## REAL ESTATE MARKET.

We have again to record the unusual number of fifty legal sales advertised for the coming week by plaintiffs, prominent among whom the New York Life Insurance Company stands credited with five actions involving \$115,000. Last week our list of legal sales numbered forty-one, the net results of which showed thirty-one pieces of property brought in by the plaintiff, three actual sales and seven adjournments. It is surmised that the plaintiff in many cases became the not unwilling owner of the property involved.

The sale of forty-four lots belonging to the Nathaniel Niles estate was withdrawn, the executors deciding that the market would not warrant the offering.

Plans to the number of twenty-seven, involving the erection of forty-nine buildings, costing \$415,800, have been filed this week at the Department of Buildings. This shows an increase over last week, but a slight decrease in comparison with last year when thirty plans, involving fifty buildings, costing \$430,150, were filed. In anticipation of the success of rapid transit, Mr. F. P. Furnald will erect eight dwellings on Seventh avenue corner One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street. Mr. Joseph F. Loubat proposes building a five-story iron front store, on Nos. 503 and 505 Broadway, costing \$75,000. On the Bowery, Nos. 313 and 315, Mr. Jacob Weeks will build two six-story stores. For other buildings our readers are referred to the regular column of Projected Buildings.

## BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

**BRICKS.**—Trade has been slow, and the market rather easier on Common Hards, a shading on cost becoming a sort of necessity, in order to keep stock in motion. At one time during the week the accumulation of cargoes afloat was very full, with the weather unfavorable for the progress of out-door work, and buyers in a very indifferent mood, but rather lower prices and other little favors finally drew out sufficient demand to work the supply down into somewhat more manageable proportions. "Up Rivers" have sold as low as \$4.25, though \$1.50 was considered an average rate, and Haverstraws went at \$5.00 @ \$5.25 @ \$5.50, the latter for very fine. On Pales, the range was \$2.00 @ \$2.50, the outside figure a little extreme, and the sales not very large or rapid. As we close, there seems to be a slightly more confident undertone, and a belief is expressed in a steadier market near at hand. A great deal of work commences to appear above the foundations, the first of May has passed, and new jobs have already been taken in hand, with contractors likely to soon be on the lookout for material, and the available supply of brick is not large. The major portion of manufacturers, to be sure, are either at work or in a forward state of preparation, but the recent unpropitious weather has retarded production and with the bulk of the old crop now marketed, the selling interest could probably gain some advantage on any important addition to the demand. For export, the inquiry has not been free, and we hear of only a couple of cargoes sold. The total clearances last month were a trifle over one million brick. Croton Fronts are in about the average demand, and command former rates. Baltimore Fronts have had some few inquiries lately, but the cost is rather high for the average consumer. Philadelphians are doing fairly, but are not commanding as much by \$1.00 @ \$2.00 per M., as Trentons, the latter appearing to be in favor this spring, and the supply scant. We quote Pale, P. M., \$2.00 @ \$2.50; Hards, Up-rivers \$4.25 @ \$4.75; Haverstraw bay, \$5.00 @ \$5.50; favorite brands, \$5.75 @ \$6.00; Fronts, Croton—brown, \$7; dark \$8; red, \$9; Philadelphia, \$2.25 @ \$2.75; Trenton, \$24.00 @ \$29.00; Baltimore, \$3 @ \$38.00. Yard prices, delivery included, \$2 @ \$3 higher on ordinary and \$5.00 @ \$6.00 on fronts.

**GLASS.**—The absence of a combination still keeps the market in a somewhat uncertain condition. A portion of the trade endeavor to make their discounts as nearly uniform as possible, but not under any mutual understanding or agreement, and there is therefore a pretty general tendency to shape terms to a more favorable form when an effort is necessary to secure some very desirable customer. The general business at the moment is rather moderate, and while quotations are still to some extent nominal about 10 and 20 per cent. on French, and 70 and 5 per cent. on American, appears to be somewhere near the average discount.

**HARDWARE.**—The movement of stock continues fair, mostly toward ordinary and regular outlets, and at times the market had a pretty quick tone. Business, however, is by no means up to hopes and expectations, and the most promising buyers stop short the moment they have completed their carefully prepared lists. On prices the old irregularity prevails, and price lists at discounts are not allowed to stand in the way if a moderate deviation will secure the order for any reasonably full quantity of goods. We however, learn of no important variation made public since our last.

**LATH.**—The position has remained the same, possibly a shade firmer, but without new features worthy of note. Not many dealers are really in want of stock, but those who do come upon the market mean business, and with limited arrivals receivers have sufficient advantage to hold the basis of value steady at \$1.50 per M. for cargoes lots. It is evident, however, that the position just at the moment possesses very little natural buoyancy, and very few additional arrivals are desired. We understand that the great bulk of the piled-out stock has been worked off in small lots.

**LIME.**—Something new has at least been developed, and it comes in the form of a decline on Eastern. Manufacturers have not forced in upon receivers any remarkably large amount of stock as yet, but trade is so very slow that even an ordinary run of arrivals makes a surplus, which must either be carried, and run up expenses, or offered on terms attractive to buyers. The latter course has been adopted, and the rates are now marked down to 75c. for common, and 90c. for finishing. On State lime the business is also moderate, and naturally values have followed the course of the Eastern product.

**LUMBER.**—We are unable to discover much animation to business or any good indications of early revival. In few cases dealers are lucky enough to secure some fair sized orders, now and then an export account, for pine, etc., and in same lots there is still quite a little amount of stuff in the way of hardwoods, especially walnut going abroad, but taking the average through our lumbermen are doing a comparatively small trade. We can find no new explanation for this condition of the market, the general theory still attributing the slack business to the most rigid economy of consumption, an entire absence of waste, and a positive refusal among all buyers to handle one foot more than the most careful calculation assures them will be required. Even as slow as the movement appears, however, it makes a steady drain upon the stocks when no contracting purchases are consummated, and we note evidences of a reduced and broken accumulation in many cases. Yet so thoroughly has the hand to month plan of operation permeated the different divisions of the trade, that the consumer, the retailer, the jobber, and the wholesale dealer all wait until they see pretty nearly the last stick going out before thinking of replenishment. This same condition of affairs to a greater or less extent prevails on most of the seaboard markets with every evidence of continuation, but how far it will tend to counteract the feeling on the primary market remains to be seen. The Eastern and Canadian producer talks steady to firm, and at the West the expression of tone is very strong at advanced figures, with the latter position apparently better fortified than any other on the present outlook. The run of logs has been short, stocks are reported small and buyers have been found to pay the higher figures asked, forming a good basis for confidence, but happily this far failing to infuse any general tendency to speculative movements of magnitude. As a matter of course Chicago goes off at a tangent, and some of the reports from that city appear to predict a sky-rocket sort of advance, without admitting the possibility of the return of the empty stock, to carry out the simile in the form of an overstrained and consequently collapsed market. But this view of the situation is not general exceptions to the rule, being found even at Chicago, and journals which are accepted as authority at the West, take the conservative policy of carefully nursing the advantage accrued and increasing only when supported by positive demand from buyers who will move stocks into consumption. "Supply and demand," in fact, seems to form the pivot upon which values hinge, to a much larger extent than for many years, with a prevailing tendency to let demand have its own natural development and competition, and thus secure to supply all it is worth on its natural merits. The assumption that crop or supply would be short against some distant, and frequently near-by future want, has brought more operators to grief in this country during the past few years than any other speculative theory, simply because consumers and intermediate actual handlers of goods rendered absolutely no assistance, but on the contrary, forewarned by the attempted and possibly temporarily successful addition to cost have so cut down operations as to fully neutralize all buoyant tendencies or bring about disastrous reaction. This has not been confined to luxuries, but has probably been more marked on the most ordinary articles of the food and clothing product, and it would be remarkable if lumber should escape the same fate under similar circumstances. There is little reason to doubt that lumber has passed the lowest point of depression if the markets of the country are judiciously managed, but the effervescent portion of the Trade who hope to regain all lost ground in one season should recall to memory the fable of the goose and the golden egg.

Eastern Spruce shows no great change. Demand is

moderate from most quarters, and all buyers who are considered as first-class customers are very close and cautious in their bids. By keeping supplies down to moderate compass, manufacturers and dealers manage to hold values about as before, but there is an absence of strength and little to counteract pressure to realize should the attempt be made. We quote at \$12@13 50 for random, possibly \$14.00 for choice lengths in small cargo, and \$14@15.00 for specials, the extreme for extra difficult.

White Pine is moving moderately, and except the support obtained through the strength of the primary markets, the position has little support. Home wants as usual are small and give little promise of increase, while the demand on foreign account is erratic, with limits so low as to afford little margin for profit, even when sales can be closed. We quote at \$15@17 per M. for West India shipping boards; \$19.50@20.50 for South American do.; \$15@16 for box boards; \$17 for do, wide and sound; and timber to order at \$30@40 per M.

Yellow Pine in moderate demand for consumption in this vicinity, and few satisfactory specifications can be placed. The orders for shipment, too, are somewhat backward still, but afford some relief occasionally. Prices without many positive changes. We quote random cargoes at about \$18@21 per M.; ordered cargoes, \$22@24 do; green flooring boards, \$20@21 do; and dry do., \$20@23; Cargoes at the South, \$14@15.50 per M.; hewn timber, \$7.50@14.

Hardwoods are steady and not very plenty. The exporters continue to afford an outlet for a fair amount of walnut, and more or less demand prevails for cherry on local account, but other kinds are rather dull at the moment. We quote at wholesale rates by car load about as follows: walnut \$7@8 per M.; ash, \$32@38 do; oak, \$35@40 do; maple, \$30@35; chestnut, 1st and 2d, \$30@35; do., do., culls, \$18@20 do; cherry, \$15@17 do.; white wood, 1/2 and 5/8 inch, \$25@27.50, and do. inch, \$32@35 do.; hickory, \$25@30 do. for Western, and \$40@50 for good near-by stock.

Yard business is moderately active, the movement covering about the usual amounts and assortments, and with no great variation in price. Stock in many cases appear to be reduced and broken, but as a rule dealers are not much inclined to replenish until absolutely forced to in order to retain their custom.

Recent lumber charters are as follows: A Nor. barque, 450 tons, from Pensacola to Oran, Algiers, deals, 26; a schr., 190 tons, from Calais to Sagua, lumber, \$16; a Br. schr., 250 M. lumber, from Savannah to Cadiz, 15; a schr., 227 tons, from Orange Bluff to Barbadoes, lumber, \$8; an Am. brig, 281 tons, from Wilmington to Pernambuco, lumber, \$30 and primeval; an Am. brig, 483 tons, from Portland to Montevideo or Buños Ayres, lumber, \$14 net, up-river ports \$3 extra; a schr., 350 M. rawed lumber, from Pensacola to Boston, \$8 or Portland, \$8.50; a schr., 299 tons, 350 M. lumber, from Pensacola to New York, \$7, or Boston, \$7.50; a schr., 190 M. lumber, from Satilla River to Rockland, \$7; a schr., 350 M. lumber, from Pensacola to New York, \$7; a schr., 175 M. lumber, from Jacksonville to New London, \$6; a schr., 175 M. lumber, from Savannah to New York, \$5; a schr., 250 M. lumber and timber, from St. Simons Mills to New York, \$6 and \$7; two schrs., 154 and 226 tons, hence to Jacksonville and back with lumber, \$8 for the round; a schr., 120 M. lumber, from Fernandina to New York, \$6; a schr., 150 M. lumber, same voyage \$7, covering outward cargo hence.

#### GENERAL LUMBER NOTES.

##### THE WEST.

The *Lumberman's Gazette* has the annexed:

BAY CITY, Friday, April 26, 1878.

The activity which marked our last report of the lumber market continued during the past week and nearly all the dry lumber on the river has been sold. Several buyers are now in the market looking around to pick up what stray lots still remain unsold. Considerable of this year's cut has been sold at \$6, \$12@28.

The heavy rains which have fallen during the past week have raised the streams throughout the lumber regions so that we anticipate no further trouble at present from the drives. The probabilities are that all the logs in the various streams will reach the booms within a short time. Reports from the lumber districts of Wisconsin show that the streams throughout that State have also raised sufficiently to make a good drive.

Shingle trade is still active and prices remain firm. The wholesale quotations following are the prices at which manufacturers hold stocks.

The Chicago correspondent of April 26th says:—The demand continues heavy for all kinds of lumber and especially from a distance. The low rate of freights from here all over the West and especially to the Southwest is taking much stock daily. St. Louis being one of the large buyers now, and the local and nearby demand has been good, but with the prevailing wet weather this will now probably fall off. This has been a very wet week, and we think wide extended, and may have more to do with the lumber prospects than one would at first think, for the streams will be raised and many logs brought down that would have been left on the banks only for the prevailing rains.

The receipts for the past week have been about 20,000,000, while the shipments have been about 17,000,000 feet, a very small accumulation for a market that is so badly broken. We understand that we may expect large receipts of dry stock from the Saginaws.

Prices are well maintained at quotations. If any shading is done it is well known why, and is kept very

close. Sales at the docks have been about as follows: Piece stuff, \$8.75@9.00; common boards, \$9.75@11.00; shingles, \$2.10@2.25.

Frieghts may be put about on the basis of \$1 from Muskegon; they are not yet definitely settled, but will be soon, we suppose.

The Stillwater (Minn.) *Gazette* says:

Information from the upper part of the logging country indicates that the prospects for the drives coming in are very flattering, and that they will get in at least thirty days ahead of the usual time. A few old logs are now running into the boom.

##### THE EAST.

A correspondent of the *Lumbermen's Gazette* writes from Oldtown, Me.

The weather here is fine, the snow is all off, and the frost nearly all out of the ground.

The prospect for driving looks hard on the small streams and brooks. There is no snow to make water, and the streams are low for this season of the year. Lumbermen have got to depend entirely on rain to fetch their logs out. It is early yet to tell, but the general impression is, that a large amount of logs will be left back.

But few mills have started up, as yet, and those by parties who wintered logs. None of the mills that are for rent, have been taken yet, and business does not start as brisk as many supposed it would.

The Bangor Boom Co. have let the driving and delivery of the logs from the Penobscot Boom to Bangor, a distance of 14 miles, to John Crain & Co., at 39 cents per M. This includes rafting out of the Bangor Boom and delivery at the mills in tide water.

According to the Bangor (Me.) *Whig*, the saw mills on the St. Croix River, Me., are expected to start up rather earlier than usual this spring, as the lakes and rivers are already clear of ice, and driving is in progress. It is stated that the cut of logs on that stream and the lakes which feed it, will fall considerably short of the customary amount, owing to the early breaking up of the hauling. The shipment of lumber from Calais, the principal manufacturing point on that river, has already begun.

##### FOREIGN.

From the *Timber Trades Journal* we make the following extracts:

**LONDON.** April 12th, 1878.

There is very little improvement to report in the state of the timber trade, which, perhaps, in the provinces and midland districts, has seldom been so much depressed at this season of the year as it is at present. Those who hold stocks cannot get a profit if they stand for ready money, and a good deal of embarrassment among the building fraternity renders them very cautious of giving the usual easy credit. A party appealed to us to the state of business in his neighborhood, where he appeared to have a large stock of foreign timber and deals, remarked that "he had at present only the alternative to weep over his goods, or to weep after them," signifying thereby, that he had rather hold than sell to parties on credit, whose ability to pay, he no longer had any confidence in.

##### LIVERPOOL, April 10th, 1878.

There is no improvement in the state of our market, excepting, perhaps, for pitch pine timber, for which a better feeling exists, and late sales show that the lowest point has been touched, and the tendency of the market is now upward. There is little doing in spruce and commoner qualities of deals, and the business done in Canadian woods, is merely of a retail character, which makes but little impression upon our heavy stocks, and the sales that are made run chiefly upon good to prime qualities, of which the quantity now on hand is comparatively small.

**METALS.**—**COPPER.**—Ingot has shaded off in cost somewhat, and the tone is still a little slack, but holders are not inclined to give way freely. We quote at 16 1/2@17 1/2 for Lake. Manufactured copper held at about former rates, but the market quiet. We quote as follows: Brazier's Copper, ordinary sizes, over 16 oz., per sq. foot, 28c. per lb : do., do., do., 16 oz. and over 12 oz. per sq. foot, 30c. per lb.: do., do., 10 and 12 oz. per sq. foot, 32c. per lb.: do., do., lighter than 10 oz. per sq. foot, 34c. per lb.: circles, less than 81 inches in diameter, 31c. per lb.: do. 81 inches diameter and over, 34c. per lb.; segment and pattern sheets, 31c. per lb.; locomotive fire box sheets, 28c. per lb.; Sheathing Copper, over 12 oz., per square foot, 26c. per lb., and Bolt Copper, 28c. per pound. Iron—Scotch Pig continues to job out slowly in the usual form, and is nominally steady. We quote at \$22@26 per ton according to brand and quantity. American Pig cannot be moved in large quantity, buyers contenting themselves with just enough for immediate wants, and refusing to go beyond. Values about as before. We quote at \$18@19 for No. 1 per ton, \$17@18 for No. 2 do., and \$16@17 for Forge. Rails are in good demand and higher on steel, most of the mills being compelled to refuse further orders. We quote at \$32@35 for new iron, and \$44@45.00 for Steel at the mills. Old Rails, \$18.00@19.00 per ton; scrap, \$22.00@22.50; the latter slow. Manufactured iron in quite limited demand, and a little irregular on value. Common Merchant Bar can be had in round lots at 1.7c. and Refined at 1.9c., but for ten-ton lots from store, 1.8c. and 2c. are respectively insisted upon. Common sheet, 3c., and best R. G. American, 4c. from store. **LEAD.**—Domestic pig has not been very active, but of late holders manifested a somewhat steadier tone, and did not offer quite so freely. We quote at about 3 1/2@3 3/4c. currency. The manufacturers of lead are quoted: Bar, 5 1/2c.; Pipe, 6c., and Sheet, 6 1/2c.—less the usual discount to the trade; and Tin-lined Pipe, 15c.

Block Tin Pipe, 45c., on same terms. Trs.—Pig selling slowly, and the general tone of the market, easy all around. We quote at 17 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 17 $\frac{3}{4}$ c. for Banca, 14 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 14 $\frac{3}{4}$ c. for Straits, 14 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 15c. for English Refined, and 14 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 14 $\frac{3}{4}$ c. for do. common. Tin plates favor the buyer, without attracting attention beyond ordinary wants. Spelter in moderate demand from manufacturers at about former rates, and quoted 5 $\frac{1}{4}$  to 5 $\frac{3}{4}$ c. Sheet zinc slow and barely steady. We quote at 7 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 8c. gold for foreign, and 6 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. currency for domestic.

**NAILS.**—The amount of stock available still appears to be large enough for all wants, with a little to spare. The demand does not greatly improve, and is confined principally to the ordinary run of trade orders, with an occasional invoice for export on the Pacific coast. We quote on a basis of \$2.50 to \$2.60 for 10d. to 60d.

**OILS.**—Business has had a somewhat irregular tone on the wholesale market, but in a jobbing way there was a fair average distribution and a steady feeling on values. Linseed oil is quoted at 60 to 62c. per gallon from crushers hands.

**PAINTS.**—Of standard seasonable goods there is a fair amount going out from day to day, but no unusual demand, and indeed, as a whole, the market is a little dull. Jobbers prices remain as before, with a steady tone, and supply and assortment of stock available quite equal to the call. According to reports published it has been resolved by corrodors, jobbers and dealers that hereafter on all sales of pure White Lead in Oil, in any quantity under 500 lb. at one time, not less than 9 cents net shall be charged, subject to no rebate or cash discount, unless the sales be made to buyers entitled to a rebate under the rules, in which case this rule does not apply.

**PITCH.**—The market is dull and seemingly unchanged. Stocks are not oppressive upon the market, but are ample, with owners willing to sell on any fair bid, and prices rule easy. We quote at \$2.00 to 2.25 for city delivered.

**SPIRITS TURPENTINE.**—Business has proven somewhat unsettled, but much the usual amount went out in a jobbing way, and sellers managed to secure a pretty steady range of prices, although on wholesale lots there was some shading. We quote at 29 to 32c. according to quantity of stock handled.

**TAR.**—The accumulation of stock on hand is not very large, but still quite enough for the requirements of the market, and holders are, as a rule, willing to sell. Prices under the circumstances are easy. We quote at \$2.00 to 2.25 for Newberne and Washington and \$2.12 to 2.37 $\frac{1}{2}$  for Wilmington.

## CONVEYANCES.

Wherever the letters Q. C. and C. a. G. occur, preceded by the name of the grantee, they mean as follows: 1st—Q. C. is an abbreviation for Quit Claim deed, i.e., a deed in which all the right, title and interest of the grantor is conveyed, omitting all covenants or warranty.

2d—C. a. G. means a deed containing Covenant against Grantor only, in which he covenants that he hath not done any act whereby the estate conveyed may be impeached, charged or incumbered.

## ALBANY LUMBER MARKET.

The Argus reports for the week ending April 30, 1878:

The market since our last report has been rather quiet, and little will be done until new lumber comes forward freely. Prices of pine lumber are unchanged.

The hardwood trade moves along steadily at quotations.

Coarse lumber will be coming forward now that the Champlain canal is about to be opened, and fair supplies are looked for within the next few days. The trade since our last has been moderate, and prices unchanged.

Continued activity is reported in the Chicago and Cincinnati markets, and at advancing prices, many heavy dealers being free purchasers of lumber, which is taken as fast as it arrives. How far this may be checked by the heavy rains, which have recently fallen in the lake lumber districts, and, which, it is stated, will float to the mill booms, and that within a short time, the logs banked last winter remains to be seen. Similar reports reach us from the lumber lands on the Mississippi river.

We do not notice any further shipments of lumber from Tonawanda to Bay City; that a movement of so much importance to the trade, was not known a week ago, to "one of the trade" who reports for an evening paper, shows how unfitted he is for so important a charge.

Exception was also taken to a statement in our last report, which was based on information furnished us by a gentleman in the district, of whose judgment we have long availed ourselves in preference to those of the Journal's reporter, who is on safe ground only, when he rehashes the reports of the Argus.

The receipts at Chicago, from January 1st, 1878, to April 19th, were 51,438,000 feet against 22,360,000 feet for a corresponding period in 1877. The shipments were 120,418,000 feet against 102,360,000 feet.

The receipts of lumber at Buffalo for the week by lake are 4,346,000 feet; by rail, 58 cars. At Oswego the lake receipts for the week, 2,600,000 feet; the shipments by canal, 1,800,000 feet.

Freights: To Albany from Buffalo, \$2.00 per M foot; from Tonawanda, \$2.05; from Oswego, \$1.75.

At a meeting of the Board of Lumber Dealers, held Monday, April 29, the following were adopted as the rules of this market:

The limit of credit without interest shall be sixty days from date of bill.

The deduction for cash shall not exceed two per cent.

The expense of cartage, and one-half the expense of measuring and inspection, shall be borne by the purchaser, and items showing amount of such expense shall appear on bills rendered.
