CAPABILITIES OF THE WEST SIDE.

The extension of the Elevated Road, above Fifty-ninth street, into the heart of the section distinctively termed the West Side, will afford facilities of access such as this quarter of the city has never before known. Until quite recently, the main dependence of travelers through this picturesque but benighted region was the old-fashioned omnibus which still plods its way on the Grand Boulevard. Within two or three years the Eighth avenue railroad commenced running cars to One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and, finally, to Macomb's Dam. With the establishment of steam transit we may expect that public attention will be particularly drawn to this quarter of the city, and, in the near future, the most interesting subject among real estate dealers and builders will be the capabilities of the West Side. It is needless now to recall the unparalleled speculation which once raged in this property. The whole intensity and momentum of the last speculative era in real estate were concentrated in operations in this section. Its results have been in no wise dissimilar from those which have attended every great and spirited speculation that had previously occurred in New York real estate. It is not unlikely that hopes may be now cherished of an early revival of speculative interest in this quarter. Sales of large blocks have recently been reported, at prices which indicate either a sudden appreciation in what was believed to be current values, or else the transactions are put forth, as feelers, by interested parties to test the amount and degree of interest which is taken in such real estate. Advertisements are cropping out from time to time in the daily journals, either offering large parcels for sale or soliciting the proffer of parcels for purchase. These are well-known devices in the manual of real estate speculation, and may or may not be prompted in such interest. As an offset to these speculative symptoms there are constantly recurring foreclosure sales of property scattered through this region, which seem to produce no better prices than have been obtained in similar transactions during the past four years. A prominent operator recently purchased, for one thousand dollars, a lot on Seventy-sixth street near Eighth avenue which he had sold five years previously for seventy-five hundred dollars—the then purchaser having carried it and discharged all liens upon it to the time of its recent voluntary sale by him. This is but one of the many episodes of speculation which receive frequent illustration, and is alluded to here more to point a moral than to establish a criterion of value. Whether a fresh speculation is to spread over this familiar field again is a question difficult to determine at this early day. We naturally call to mind the com-

mon saying that birds rarely return to a region where they have heard the crack of the sportsman's rifle.

The exceedingly low prices which are ruling in this section, represent a true and complete reaction from former high prices of inflation and speculation. That intrinsic value is above present levels must be cheerfully conceded; but whether the intervening margin is to be reaped by builders—actual consumers of the lots—or by mere speculators is a vital and important question. With the conservatism which now so deeply imbues the minds of solvent builders, it will be difficult to induce them to embark in building enterprises after values have been stilted by speculation. If speculators expect to find their profit in the manipulation of this property, they will be likely to lack the co-operation or countenance of the building community, and may in consequence suffer the penalty of having to carry their land for an indefinite period. Whereas, if the present *bona fide* owners are able to carry their holdings and await the appearance of acceptable master builders—with whom they may deal directly, without the intervention of middlemen, the prospect is full of encouragement that the improvement of this vast area will be begun promptly and in earnest.

The advantages possessed by this section at the present time, above what it was possible to claim for it when the speculation was at its height, are obvious. The leading avenues and cross streets are regulated and graded, and two, at least, of the avenues and a great number of the cross streets are curbed, sewered and paved, thus rendering them quite ready for the operations of builders. Besides, rapid transit is already within hailing distance of a good part of it.

We propose to offer a passing review of the several localities of the West Side and to try and determine what classes of improvements are suitable for them:

EIGHTH AVENUE.—This avenue extends in an unbroken line to Harlem River. It is paved, regulated and ready for building as far as One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and is regulated and graded as far as One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, the extension to the Harlem River being now under way. In any rational contemplation of the subject, it would seem to be quite an easy matter to foretell the use to which Eighth avenue above Fifty-ninth street is likely to be put in the future. The idea of attracting fashionable residence to this side of the city at all, and particularly to Eighth avenue, must be set down as a pure chimera, and in subversion of the obvious principle of our city's growth. There has been no instance in the past history of the city where a business street has germinated into an avenue of permanent residences. The attempts made on First and Second avenues to reclaim the upper portions for first-class residences have proved failures; and we doubt not that the same result would attend any similar effort on the West Side and particularly on Eighth avenue. Notwithstanding the endless pains and enormous expense which have been undertaken to forestall and insure the destiny of this quarter, we think owners of Eighth avenue

lots will find their most profitable market and their surest road to adequate income in encouraging the erection of apartment houses of the first class, or of stores and apartment houses combined, such as already embellish the line of Eighth avenue at different points between Forty-second street and Fifty-ninth street, particularly in the neighborhood of the Park. These may be taken as the typical improvements which are destined to force their way on Eighth avenue. An intimate acquaintance with the taste and temper of the modern house buyer prompts the assurance that no speculative attempt at building private residences, and, indeed, no further private projection of them may be looked for on the westerly side of the Park.

THE GRAND BOULEVARD.—This magnificent monument of the era of fraud seems likely to become a standing menace and rebuke to corrupt officials and daring speculators, besides an expensive plague and constant distraction to property owners. The dreams and expectations of its originators have, so far, utterly failed of any adequate realization; and, as if to dispel them entirely, the first substantial improvements of the Boulevard consist of stores and common tenements, which have been erected within the past year at the corner of Sixty-seventh street. We confess that this class of improvements is altogether unworthy of this great avenue, and can, in no wise, be taken as typical of what is to come. Doubtless, we must reconcile ourselves to the surrender of the Boulevard to mixed commercial purposes. We expect to see in our day no erection of any notable private residence on this avenue; but rather that the tradition and character of lower Broadway will be perpetuated and fulfilled on the Grand Boulevard, which is, after all, nothing but a continuation of our great main avenue. Doubtless, imposing specimens of the apartment system will be here projected; but, in every case, we venture to assert, the first floor will be ultimately appropriated for business purposes.

NINTH AVENUE.—As the avenue on which the extension of the elevated road is to be made, property holders on this line may be regarded as performing an act of vicarious sacrifice. The great benefit which will accrue to property holders generally in this region by the completion of rapid transit is likely to be enjoyed at the expense of the owners on Ninth avenue. We can cherish no expectation that the improvements on this avenue, certainly as far as the elevated road extends, will be other than similar to those in lower Ninth avenue, that is, common stores and plain tenements; and, doubtless, this character will be maintained to the terminus of the avenue at One Hundred and Tenth street.

TENTH AVENUE.—The common tenement has gained such complete possession of Tenth avenue, and projection has advanced so far above Fifty-ninth street already, that we cannot imagine its career can be checked. As the central avenue in this great district, Tenth avenue may, in its upper portion, take on a character of the fine retail business mart similar to Sixth avenue and portions of Fourth avenue. At the upper portions, in Manhattanville and Carmansville, it is

already recognized as the principal business avenue.

**ELEVENTH AVENUE.**—The proximity of this avenue to the river front must determine its use also for tenement-house purposes—at all events, until it reaches One Hundred and Sixth street, where it merges into the Grand Boulevard. Its title would disqualify it for fashionable purposes, as would that of Avenue Z, if one existed.

**RIVERSIDE AVENUE.**—This great avenue extends from Seventy-second to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, and is the only one, as far as we can see, on the West Side, which is likely to attract residence occupation. And yet, when we remember how completely eschewed have been the avenues on the eastern side of the city which overlook the splendid panorama of the East River, we must confess that we are a little dubious as to the successful exploiting of fine residences even on Riverside avenue. The most hopeful view that we can entertain with regard to its future is that it may be a repetition of what is known as Beekman place on the East River, calling for residences of a good second-class.

**NEW AVENUES.**—Topographical exigencies call for the erection of several new avenues in this district, many of which have not yet been named, and are of such short lengths as hardly to call for special notice. The principal and longest one is that which commences at One Hundredth street and runs to One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, skirting the easterly side of Morningside Park and the westerly side of the Sacred Heart grounds. We believe the interests of this section would have been promoted by bisecting the long blocks with these new avenues. By this means avenues would have been afforded having no continuous connection with the business avenues of the lower end of the island, and for this reason eligible for the erection of the better class of dwellings. The only avenues that we should expect to be devoted to an exclusively residence occupation are these few new avenues.

**ST. NICHOLAS AVENUE.**—Starting from the corner of Sixth avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street St. Nicholas avenue runs diagonally, crossing the intervening avenues until it reaches an angle with One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, where it is bifurcated, one arm running diagonally to the corner of Eleventh avenue and One Hundred and Thirtieth street, called Manhattan street; the other trending across One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street in a northerly direction until it reaches One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street. The lower portion of this avenue will doubtless assimilate in its improvements to those already existing in Harlem. The upper or ridge portion of it, where it really has only one side—*i. e.*, the westerly side—suitable for improvement is likely to be occupied with city chateaux or villas. The peculiar formation and the magnificent view which is here to be obtained will encourage and define this style of improvement.

We will now consider the lateral sections of this district.

**1. FROM FIFTY-NINTH TO SEVENTY-SECOND STREET.**—The side streets through this belt are likely to be affected by the enormous business which is being concentrated on the North River at and north of Sixtieth street. The grain elevators, the Abattoir and other manufacturing and trade establishments which have been lately erected at this point will certainly determine the class of building improvement for many of these side streets, and it will be of a grade calculated to accommodate the employees of these various industries. The influences likely to radiate from these establishments, we believe, will extend certainly to or near the Grand Boulevard; and the side streets south of Seventy-second street may be considered as so far prejudiced by this influ-

ence as to be suitable for the erection of none but the plainest and simplest models of dwellings.

**2. FROM SEVENTY-SECOND TO NINETY-SIXTH STREET.**—This district embraces much of the grandeur of this famed section. Here the highest grades are to be found, and, in consequence, the most commanding interior and river views. Whatever virtue is derivable from such elements must be enjoyed in the fullest measure by the district within the present bounds. The uneven formation of the surfaces discloses itself in many unmanageable promontories of rock and reciprocal depressions of swamp. Whether these will be graded to a common level, or whether they will be subjected to a specific treatment in adapting them to some special occupation, cannot now be determined. The more enthusiastic devotees of the West Side will certainly seek to exploit their peculiar ideas in choice and select localities within this district. Doubtless, improvements in the way of private dwellings may be expected primarily on the broad streets, but ultimately on all the side streets within this precinct, which may be set down as the prospective fashionable quarter of the West Side, if it is ever to be blessed with one.

**3. NINETY-SIXTH TO ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTIETH STREET.**—The declivity common to the whole of Harlem commences at this point and descends into the basin known as Harlem Plains. But, unlike the easterly side, the depression is quickly overcome at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, where we begin to ascend the heights that terminate in Fort George and Fort Washington. The occupation of this low section must necessarily be of an inferior grade to that of the higher regions around; and, doubtless, will partake of the standard already adopted throughout Harlem.

**4. FROM ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTIETH TO ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-FIFTH STREET.**—The region embraced within these limits may be considered the most sightly and satisfying on the whole island. At points along this line it is possible to gain, in addition to a fine view of the Palisades and the Hudson, a view of the East River and Long Island Sound. There can be nothing impertinent in suggesting that this portion of the West Side is likely to be permanently improved with the finest specimens of the city chateau, and that, before many years, this entire district will be occupied with cosy and comfortable villas.

Unless we are greatly mistaken in our calculations, the leading avenues of the West Side are to be devoted mainly, like the lower ends of the same, to business purposes. The intervening cross streets are likely to be required for dwelling houses, but in the main of plain and simple type. The permanent establishment of the fashionable quarter of the city on the easterly side of the Park would render forlorn the hope, and fruitless the attempt to create any detached and sporadic settlements of fashionable and wealthy people at points on the West Side. Rapid transit lines will effectually shut off the West Side from vital union with the East Side, and the dwellers in this region are likely to be those whose business interests connect them naturally with that side of the city, or those who can be conveniently carried to their places of business by the rapid transit line.

What ages hence may have in store for West Side owners, we will not undertake to prophesy. We have no desire to trifling with their expectations or to question the value of their estates. We are seeking simply to take a rational, practical and warrantable view of the West Side situation as it exists to-day. If it is the aim of these owners to artificially force their land to high values, or to carry the same for any great period in anticipation of its becoming a very fashionable and expensive quarter, we can only say that we think they invoke the chances of great additional ex-

pense without any assured prospect of corresponding gain. Whereas, by accepting the situation as it is plainly defined to-day, and permitting their properties to be improved in a simple, unpretentious and economical manner, they insure present and prompt income. The model dwelling that we would suggest, for this side of the city, is the semi-detached city cottage, such as is peculiar to West Philadelphia. These present the double advantage of being the most spacious and most inexpensive of any dwelling that can be erected. At the same time they furnish the opportunity of inclosing spaces of ground around the houses, which would lend a great charm and attraction to them. Otherwise, we presume, the model of our plain three and four-story houses, built shoulder to shoulder, will be adhered to in the dwelling improvements of this side. Within ten years we believe the character of this section of the city will have so far defined itself that multitudes who have cherished the most extravagant and preposterous notions with regard to it, will wonder how they ever could have been led so far astray.

## MARKET REVIEW.

### REAL ESTATE MARKET.

The market has not shown much activity during the week, and there seems to be a total absence of dealings at the Exchange, except in property offered under judicial decrees. The premises at the northeast corner of Madison avenue and Sixty-seventh street (100.5x125), were sold on Tuesday last for \$60,000, and the parcel of land situated on the northeast corner of Madison avenue and Eighty-fifth street, with lots on Eighty-sixth street, was sold for \$25,000, and the block bounded by Seventh avenue, St. Nicholas avenue, One Hundred and Eighteenth and One Hundred and Nineteenth streets, brought \$30,000. The two parcels realizing \$55,000, or \$36,000 less than the amount of liens affecting the property. In some instances, a few parcels realized the amount of the mortgage on the premises sold.

## BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

NOTE.—In the hurry of making up our forms for last week's issue a transposition of tabular matter took place, through which statistics of the year's movement of Cement appeared under Doors, Sash and Blinds, and figures showing the exports of the latter articles were printed under Drain and Sewer Pipe.

**BRICK.**—The market is in a somewhat unsettled condition. Up to the present writing we have learned of no sales showing a positive change on values, and this, in some cases, forms basis for the claim that matters can only be called steady, but, on the other hand, sellers' views are firmer and higher, and it is pretty certain that the opening of any demand would give them support in the position. Of course, the main stimulus to buoyancy on values has been the "cold spell," through which the condition of the river prevents navigation and retards supplies. For the present we retain the former general range of quotations as representing the latest reported actual sales, but the figures must be accepted as merely nominal, and probably lower than would be accepted. Indeed, some of the few cargoes afloat are held as high as \$6,50, and owners say they intend to "stick" there, or go higher. Demand shows much indifference, and beyond what the railroads may be using there appears to be very little consumption at the moment, while most of the leading dealers seem to be satisfied with the amount of stock they have under accumulation. Fronts are also slow, and without quotable change. We quote Pale, 70 M., \$2,500/2,75; Hards, Up-rivers, \$4,300/4,60; Haystack bay, \$5,000/5,30; favorite brands, \$5,50/6,00; Fronts, Clinton—brown, \$7; dark red, \$8; Philadelphia, \$2,900/2,75; Baltimore, \$3,16/3,80. Yard prices, delivery included, \$20/3 higher on ordinary and \$20/3 on fronts.

**CEMENT.**—Demand on domestic is not very active, but takes fair proportions for the season, and in various ways quite a little stock moves out. The market, too, is firmer, now that the river has closed, and while sellers vary a little on their prices, according to quantity of stock handled, many refuse to name less than \$1,25 per bbl. Foreign is steady and offered without show of anxiety to realize.

**GLASS.**—Business still fails to take the active form hoped for, and the distribution of supplies from the stock of foreign on hand is below calculations. Holders, however, are not much inclined to force the sale of their stocks, as the amount is not large, and the assortment has been carefully made in most cases so that it is carrying, the risk is somewhat reduced. Values are nominally steady, but as usual on a dull market a clever buyer with an attractive order to fill can frequently manage to secure some little favor. The overhauling of supplies in taking inventory has also brought out a number of irregular parcels accumulated during the year, and holders who have these on hand are, as a rule, willing to close out cheap. American glass meets with moderate sale, and is, if anything, doing a trifle better than foreign prices, remaining about as before.

**HARDWARE.**—Business not very active and confined in the main to what may be considered strictly seasonal goods. Mail advices at hand, however, indicate that the wants of the country must soon increase orders from many sections, and local buyers are also likely to be in want of some additions to their stocks of standard supplies. The yearly revision of price lists has brought many changes of late, and among the most important we note the following: On Wood Screws, flat head iron, 60 per cent, discount from list; flat-head brass, 55 per cent, do, do; round head iron, 50 per cent, do, do.; round head brass, 10 per cent, do, do., cash 30 days from date of invoice. The American Copper Rivet Association have issued the following: "On the first day of July, 1878, parties who have purchased five hundred pounds, or over, of rivets and bars of one manufacturer in the previous six months may by that manufacturer be allowed a rebate of ten per cent, provided such parties have not sold at a less price than ten per cent, discount from list, No. 6."

The manufacturers of the "Nicholson," "Western" and "Dissont" files announce that the factory prices upon the above and other first quality brands for the season of six months ending June 30th, 1878, will be fixed at 35 per cent, discount, cash. The Brass Manufacturers publish a list under date of 1st inst., announcing a discount of 10 per cent, from list prices, terms cash 30 days. The list prices for brass and gilding scrap are net. The Tubing Manufacturers on 1st inst. adopted discount on brass, copper and German silver tubing at 10 per cent from list prices, zinc tubing net, terms cash 30 days. The Anchor brand of shovels, manufactured by B. E. Ward & Co., are quoted 50 per cent, discount; the "Patent" and the Oxford patent at 40 per cent discount. On Butts, Hinges, etc., the following are new: Bronzed, loose joint bolts with or without acorns, 20 per cent discount; bronzed narrow, light narrow, light, inside blind, and parliament butts, and bronzed flush bolts, 40 per cent, discount; cast butts, with acorn and friction roller, do, loose joint japanned, bronzed and silver acorns, do, without acorns, do, loose pins silvered acorns, do, parliament, 62½ and 10 per cent, discount; hinges, strap and T. long chest, hinge hasps, common staples, and crate hasps, patent swivel staples, 60 and 12½ per cent discount. The following reduced price list has been issued: Manila cordage, sizes above 12-thread, and hay rope, 13½ cents do, 12-thread (3 in. diam.) 13, and do, 6-thread and 9-thread, 14 in. and 5-16 in. (diam.) 13½; Manila cordage bolt ropes yarns 14, and do, 6-thread and 9-thread 15; Manila whale lines, 14½; tarred manila, 12; fine tarred manila lath yarn, 13½; sisal rope, sizes above 12-thread and hay and hide rope, 11; do, 12-thread (3 in. diam.) 11½, do, 6-thread and 9-thread (4 in. and 5-16 in. diam.) 12; tarred sisal lath yarn, 10½; Russia hemp tarred cordage, 12; American hacked hemp tarred cordage, 11; tarred American lath yarn, 11; fine tarred American lath yarn, 12½; navy oakum, 8½; U. S. Navy oakum, 9½; and best oakum, 10½, all net cash.

**LATH.**—The market has not as yet given receivers the advantage they hoped for and anticipated, and prices of late were in a somewhat unsettled condition. Arrivals were not particularly free, indeed, would be considered moderate during the regular open season, but with little anxiety on the demand, and cargoes frequently held for a few days until buyers could be hunted up, instead of finding buyers waiting for cargoes, sellers have scarcely been in a position to dictate terms. We have reports of sales as low as \$1,50/1,55 and as high as \$1,65 per M., but we do not think that better than the inside figures could be depended upon at the close.

**LINEN.**—About the only noticeable feature is the absence of change in price. Receivers continue to quote at the same figures current for weeks past, and it is unusual to find the winter so far forward without an upward turn. Demand, however, is quite moderate, and even the light receipts have broken all that could be well pleased. State stock selling moderately at steady rates.

**LUMBER.**—As might be expected, the influence of the holiday season has not as yet fully passed, and general trade remains rather dull, especially so on local account. The consumption for building purposes does not take much stock on fresh purchases, most of the deliveries to this outlet being on contract, and moderate at that. The manufacturing interest, too, keeps within rather narrow compass, and buyers operate only on the spur of some very urgent necessity, or to secure stock against the output of special orders. The export operations are variable, some dealers grumbling over the condition of trade, and others expressing a fair amount of satisfaction. It is probable, however, that the movement on foreign account is not altogether as full as many have been looking for, and that the limits of shippers also run somewhat below calculations due in part to pretty heavy amounts previously forwarded, and which have not yet worked down closely. The axe seems to be swinging pretty lively whenever there is the least chance for work in the woods, and the lumbermen evidently intend to make all the preparations in their power for a big run of logs in the spring, though their success will depend largely up in the aid afforded by the elements. Latest accounts were rather more favorable for operations in most lumber sections.

Eastern Spruce is reported by Receivers as a very saleable article, and they seem to think a considerable addition to the supply of desirable stock would find a ready market. Buyers are not making an open demand on a market void of any certain supplies, yet in a quiet way are on the watch for stray offerings, and would no doubt endorse the above claim of the selling interest to some extent by a quick purchase of really attractive goods. We quote at \$12,500/13,50 for random, possibly \$11,600/11,50 for choice lengths in small cargo, and \$13,500/15,50 for specials, the extreme for extra difficult.

White Pine appears to be somewhat irregular, but not enough so to greatly change the general range of values. There is some little movement on local consumptive account, but scarcely enough to greatly curtail stocks. The export demand is somewhat slow. We quote at \$13,000/17,00 per M. for West India shipping boards; \$19,500/20,50 for South American do.; \$15,000/16,00 for box boards; \$17,000 for do., white and sound; and timber at \$16,000/18,00 per M.

Yellow Pine remains pretty firm, and has been selling during the past few weeks a little more freely than the reports made indicated. This was mainly on special orders covering deliveries here and at the Eastward, and for direct shipment from the South. We quote random cargoes at \$18,500/22 per M.; ordered cargoes, \$22,000/24 do.; green hoisting boards, \$21,000/23 do.; and dry do., \$22,000/24. Cargoes at the South, \$14,500/16,50 per M.; heavy timber at \$7,500/11.

Hardwoods continue dull and more or less nominal on all grades, though buyers would not be likely to gain much advantage. We quote at wholesale rates by car load, about as follows: walnut, \$770/82,50 per M. ash, \$220/26 do.; oak, \$55/40 do.; maple, \$300/35; chestnut, 1st and 2d, \$30/35 do.; do., culls, \$180/20 do.; cherry, \$45/75 do.; white wood, 12 and 56 inch, \$25/27,50, and do. inch, \$22/25 do.; hickory, \$25/30 do. for Western, and \$40/50 for good near-by stock.

Yard trade has a rather slow movement for all classes of goods, and the market is without new features for the moment. About former rates are quoted, and dealers are steady but not exacting with good first-class cash customers.

## GENERAL LUMBER NOTES.

### THE WEST.

From the *Lumberman's Gazette* we obtain the following:

BAY CITY, Jan. 4, 1878.

As noted in last report, lumber buyers are making their appearance in this market earlier than last year. There are a number of dealers from abroad in the Valley now, but we have not as yet heard of any sales which we can chronicle, but as they have come here to buy, undoubtedly purchases will be made before they leave. This unusually early inquiry for lumber indicates that stocks in markets at other points are low, and that a fair demand will be experienced here before the spring shipments commence.

The weather for the past few days has been somewhat colder, and slight quantities of snow have fallen, but not enough to make hauling in the lumber camps. We learn from jobbers on the branches of the Tittabawassee that up to the present they have been skidding logs with fair success, but are now getting anxious for snow in order to commence hauling. This report is about a fair sample made by others. Those who took their supplies into camp early have not experienced the difficulty that those who did not now do. Many of the latter have broken up their camps and discharged their men, on account of the roads being in such condition that food for the men and cattle could not be carried in except by packing. At present writing, the prospects are looking more favorable.

The *Gazette's* Chicago correspondent of January 11 says: "The past few days have been of the most delightful quality of winter in comparison to what we have had for weeks past. The old year passed out quiet and serenely, ushering in the new with a bright, clear morning, and with the thermometer considerably lowered—a state of weather somewhat in accordance with Prof. Tice's predictions and the wish of many dealers whose trade has suffered severely by the continued soft weather. The lumber trade has suffered as much or more than any other line of business on account of the protracted wet, soft weather, not only by the diminution of demand, owing to the impassable condition of the roads, but by the expense incurred in sending men, teams and supplies to the woods, which have been a constant expense for weeks, and, so far, little or no work has been done, and in many parts of the country are breaking camp and going home, after the consumption of half their supplies and the loss of two working months. The winter is now so far gone that the anticipated log crop will not be harvested possibly, even if we should have favorable weather from this on; but the loss incurred so far by the trade in the logging business will add many per cent to the cost of stock next season. Many logs that were hung up last spring have been brought forward during the past two weeks, down the Black, Chippewa and Eau Claire rivers. During November considerable work was done in Minnesota. The ground froze solid, as did the swamps and the Mississippi river, but for weeks it has been as mild as May, and steamboats have been running on the headwaters of the "Father of Waters" for weeks, and most logging business has been suspended and the gangs gone home."

The demand in this city is as good as could be expected under the circumstances. Orders are quite liberal from the large interior towns and cities, but meager from the unimportant points.

Prices remain firm in the face of a slight demand, everyone expressing the most perfect faith in the future of the trade. It is a possible thing that the reverses experienced in this line of trade in the past two years may culminate in a few years of most prosperous times in this traffic in the near future.

The *Lumberman and Manufacturer* of Minneapolis says: "The very favorable change in the weather which has occurred within the last three days, gives promise of a splendid logging season. The melted snow and rain has formed ice bottom on the road, which in many places is as good as snow, and logging is vigorously resumed. On the long hauls they will have to content themselves with skidding until there

is a fall of snow, which will not probably be long in coming. We are still of the opinion that there is ample time to secure as many logs as will be needed next year, and probably more, on all the tributaries of the Mississippi. On the river above Minneapolis they have very few old logs, and can saw all the estimated cut next season, whatever falling off there is in the cut here will still leave more than lumber enough to supply the demand, and few want stocks to carry over a year. The removal of the mud embankment will bring a demand for lumber, but the usual dullness may be anticipated for some weeks. There is no probability of any change in the price of lumber unless it comes from a disagreement among holders, concerning time and discounts, about which there is difference at most points, and although not serious, are liable to make very serious consequences. As when lumbermen get hostile because others differ from them as to any matter they always take revenge by reducing the price of their own lumber in the hope that others will be obliged to do the same. It is entirely an original custom among the fraternity, and is at once a unique and dignified method when the advantages are so evenly distributed that no one can find fault, as they all grow poor together.

### THE EAST.

Through press of matter of late, the following has been crowded out. It covers important ground however, and may yet be read with interest. The original publication was in the columns of the *Keene Bee Journal*, about the close of last month, under the general head of

#### *The Lumber Interests of Maine.*

We present to our readers statistics concerning the lumbering operations in the State the past year compared with previous years, the prospects for the future, and other matters pertaining to the subject. The review embraces lumbering activities on the principle rivers in the State. The data was obtained from authentic sources, and the statements may be relied upon as in the main correct.

The present winter has been extremely unfavorable up to the present time, for lumbering operations on the Kennebec River and its tributaries. There has been no snow, and the lumbermen have been unable to haul logs. Teams usually begin to haul by the 1st of December; it will be a month later this year. In former years the average amount of timber cut on the river was about 125 million feet. In the winter of 1877 the cut of logs was reduced to about 60 million feet. This reduction was forced upon lumbermen by the continued depression of business. Arrangements for logging the ensuing winter of 1878 have been made for a total cut of about fifty million feet. But unless snow comes speedily, it will fall below that. Following is the cut on the river for several years: 1867, 76 million feet; 1856, 113 million feet; 1877, 60 million feet; 1878 (present year), 50 million feet.

At the present time there are very few old logs manufactured on the river. Usually the lumbermen "carry over" logs enough to supply the mills until the opening of navigation (about the 1st of May), when the new logs come down, so that few of the mills will next season be able to start up before the first of the middle of June. To secure the cut for the winter some 1,200 men have gone into the woods with about 250 teams.

The number of feet of lumber manufactured on the Penobscot River, and shipped from Bangor and vicinity, is as follows:

Quantity of logs cut on Penobscot waters, or driven into booms at mills for manufacture in the year 1867, was 178,016,000 feet; in 1876, 86,974,240 feet; in 1877, 84,918,040 feet. Estimated cut for the year 1878, 100 million feet. About 18 million feet of this is shipped to the European markets in deals—"deals" being sawed from spruce boards, mostly 3 by 7, 3 by 9, 3 by 11. Price of spruce logs at mills in 1867, \$12 per thousand; in 1877, \$9 per thousand. Price of spruce manufactured in 1867, random, \$13; dimension, \$15; 1877, random, \$10; dimension, \$11. It is estimated that the shingles and other short lumber sold in that market, will be about one-quarter of the value of the long (manufactured) lumber.

On the Passamaquoddy river, the lumbermen, as elsewhere, have been waiting for snow. It is estimated that double the amount of logs will be hauled on the Passamaquoddy and its tributaries this season than last. Some 150 men are in the woods, 80 horses and 20 oxen.

On the St. Croix river quite a number of firms have gone out of the business since 1867. If the present winter should prove a fair one for business, the stock of logs hauled will exceed that of last winter by 23% per cent. Not 10 per cent of the lumber goes to foreign ports generally. The following is the amount of lumber hauled and sawed: 1876, 63 million feet; 1877, 60 million feet.

On both branches of the St. Croix 1700 men and 850 oxen and horses are employed. About 65 million feet will be cut the present winter. Prevailing prices of lumber: Spruce \$10 to \$13, hemlock \$7 to \$8, pine \$10 to \$12, hardwood, ship-plank and timber \$15 to \$20, delivered at the vessel in Calais. The stock of logs is almost entirely sawed up; the present fall and the quantity manufactured will not vary much from 1876, there being quite a stock of old logs on hand at that time. Lumber is being got at lower rates than usual

the present season, but wages being low allows a fair margin for profit.

On the St. John river the lumber business this year will be double that of last. It is estimated that there will be driven into the St. John market this year more than 200 million feet. On the upper St. John, above Van Buren, there will be employed 700 men and 200 horses. The wages are \$15 per month for men, and \$8 for men and horses.

An intelligent gentleman in Fort Fairfield writes: The amount of lumber cut the present year, as compared with the last, will be double. Number of men employed, 4,500; number of teams, 1,200; amount of lumber cut this season, 200,000,000 feet; wages of men average \$15 per month; wages of teams of two horses, \$15 per month; average price of stumpage, \$1.75 per 1,000.

On the Saco River.—The following figures show the amount of lumber manufactured for several years: 1871, 33,000,000 feet; 1875, 24,000,000 feet; 1876, 20,000,000 feet. It is estimated that the cut for the present winter of 1877-8 will be 18,000,000 feet. These amounts do not include that manufactured by the Bartlett Land and Lumber Company, at the head of the Saco River, who manufacture each year a little over 1,000,000 feet, and ship the same by rail to Portland. No small lumber is manufactured of cedar on the river; pine, spruce and hemlock are the kinds used. About 2,000,000 of sapling shingles are annually manufactured.

On the Narraguagus River the business will be increased from last year about one-half. Number of men employed the present winter, 200; horses, 76; men, \$9; average wages paid to men, \$22 per month; Amount of anticipated cut, 13,000,000 feet. Amount annually manufactured: Long lumber, 12,000,000 feet; laths, \$1,000,000; shingles, 5,000,000; clapboard, 200,000. Prices: Pine shipping boards, \$15 per M; pine refuse boards, \$10 per M; spruce boards, \$10 per M; laths, \$1.15 per M.

On the Union River the following is a statement of the amount of lumber cut and manufactured the past season: 21,600,000 long lumber, 11,000,000 shingles, 4,000,000 laths, 10,500,000 staves, 100,000 clapboards, 500 tons Excelsior, 100,000 feet of spool wood. The above is exclusive of wood, railroad ties, hemlock bark, etc. This amount will fall short of last year's product by one-third, and will exceed that of the coming season by one-fourth.

On the Androscoggin River there has been cut, above Bethel, for the last ten years, 5,000,000 feet annually. The present season it is estimated that there will be from 26,000,000 to 30,000,000 cut. This has reference to the lumber cut for the market. Considerable is cut for home consumption.

On the Sandy River there has been very little lumber cut from 1867 to the present time, with the exception of one year. Some five years since, about 1,500,000 feet were cut.

On a review of the entire field there will, perhaps, be more lumber cut the present than the past year, and unless something unusual occurs, the low prices will prevail the next year. There have been a large number of failures during the year among lumbermen, affecting some of the largest corporations. The most of them, however, have effected a settlement, and are doing business again, their creditors having generally manifested a liberal disposition. The failures generally have not been because of bad management, extravagance or fraud, but on account of continued depression in business, and the failure of large purchasers.

### MISCELLANEOUS.

#### *Trade between England and the United States.*

The United States Consul at Bradford, in his dispatch to the Department of State of the 13th ultimo, refers to the subject of trade between England and the United States, and suggests that the choice woods of America might be disposed of in England to a much greater extent than at present if energetic steps were taken to introduce them. Black walnut is seldom, if ever, seen in furniture or house furnishing. Hickory is imported in the shape of carriage spokes and hubs, but the equally desirable ash and the second growth of the white oak are but little used, and, in short, the great variety of wooden household articles which are so common in this country, and which are classed under the general head of "woodenware," are but little known in Great Britain, and it is thought that a trade could be advantageously established in these articles.

**METALS.**—**COPPER.**—Ingot has met with a slow and uncertain demand, at prices showing a little weakness, though holders are not much disposed to press the sale of their stocks. We quote at 175@175*4* for Lake. Manufactured Copper meets with few orders, but is held steadily on a basis of the recently reduced cost. We quote as follows: Brazier's Copper, ordinary sizes, over 16 oz. per square foot, 28c. per lb.; do., do., do., 16 oz. and over 12 oz. per square foot, 30c. per lb.; do., do., 10 and 12 oz. per square foot, 32c. per lb.; circles, less than 8 inches in diameter, 34c. per lb.; do., 8 inches diameter and over, 34c. per lb.; segment and pattern sheets, 34c. per lb.; locomotive fire box sheets, 28c. per lb.; Sheathing Copper, over 12 oz. per square foot, 26c. per lb., and Bolt Copper 28c. per lb. Iron—Scotch Pig has been very dull, and values without much strength, though on the general range quoted at \$23.50@26.50, still American Pig selling to some extent on the ordinary grades, but the finer qualities slow. Value without much alteration. We quote at \$18@20 for No. 1 per ton, \$17@19 for No. 2 do., and \$16@18 for Forge. Rails in moderately active demand and ruling about steady, but without unusual strength. We quote at \$31@35 for new iron, and \$40@43 for Steel at the mills. Old Rails, \$18@19 per ton; scrap, \$22@23; the latter slow. Manufac-

tured in good jobbing demand and steady. Common Bar is quoted at 1.8@2.0c., and Refined 2@3.3c., from stove as to size and shape. LEAD—Foreign remains entirely nominal. Domestic selling moderately, and in the main in a retail way. About former rates asked, but no strength shown. We quote at about 4@5.0c. per pound. The manufacturers of lead are quoted: Bar, 1c.; Pipe, 74c.; and Sheet, 5c.—less the usual discount to the trade; and Tin-lined Pipe, 1c. Block Tin Pipe, 4c., on same terms. TIN—Pig in limited uncertain demand, and values generally have rather a weak tone. We quote at 17@18c. for Banca, 15@15.5c. for Straits, 15@15.5c. for English Refined, and 15@15.5c. for do. common. Tin Plates are offered freely and on easy terms, but buyers are not attracted, and business is dull. Spelter finds a few small orders, but no activity, and ranges at about 5.5c. per pound. Sheet Zinc is rather dull, and prices show less strength than heretofore. We quote at 7.5c. gold for foreign, and 7.5c. currency for domestic.

NAILS.—The demand moderate still and mainly in a jobbing way, to satisfy the regular trade wants. Prices as before with no gain of strength, though manufacturers are making an effort to reduce and control the production. We quote on a basis of \$2.40 per keg for 10d. to 6d.

OILS.—On many grades there has been rather an irregular tone, with more or less of a tendency in buyer's favor, but for Linseed Oil the position appears to be quite firm, and full rates demanded on a basis of 6@6.5c. from crushers' hands.

PAINTS.—The demand continues moderate, and mainly confined to invoice required for immediate wants. Not much better is expected at this season, however, and dealers seem to be confident of a good spring trade.

PITCH.—Business has proven moderate and the market somewhat tame, but about former rates preserved, especially on small lots, quoted \$2.12@2.57c. for city delivered.

SPHINXES TURPENTINE.—A somewhat variable inquiry has prevailed, but no great amount of activity was shown, and values weakened, with sales at 52@56c. 31c., according to quantity of stock handled.

TAR.—There was a moderately active movement on the ordinary receipt of orders, with stock enough for all calls and a little to spare. Prices without positive change and fairly steady. We quote at \$2.12@2.50 for Newberne and Washington, and \$2.25@2.62c. for Wilmington.

## CONVEYANCES.

Wherever the letters Q. C. and C. a. G. occur, preceded by the name of the grantee, they mean as follows: 1st—Q. C. is an abbreviation for *Quit Claim deed*, i. e., a deed in which all the right, title and interest of the grantor is conceded, omitting all covenants or warranties.
