BUILD THE HOUSES BACK.

If Ninth avenue, west of the Central Park, was not destined to be a business thoroughfare it would be a good idea for the owners of lots to build on the rear and grow shrubbery and trees in front. This would in a measure protect the occupants of the houses from being annoyed by the trains of the elevated road. There are many blocks on the route which will be unfit for stores, and on these it is hoped owners will give some variety to the city by erecting houses, say after the London suburban plan, with lanes and shrubbery, with, if possible, the rear of the edifice on the street. This will give privacy and save annoyance in many ways. So much land will be made available by the elevated roads that builders and architects will hereafter be called upon to plan houses occupying several instead of one city lot. Villas with grounds will be the new building extravagance of the millionaire of the not distant future. The fashion of a fine house on the street occupying from twenty-five to forty feet front will probably last until the central zone of the city is built upthat is, until Madison and Fifth avenues, with the cross streets, are no longer available. Then will come a taste for houses with grounds attached, and the West Side, as well as the Twenty third and Twenty-fourth Wards, will be made use of to an extent now little suspected. Nor will this take very long. The elevated roads will render a large district available for settlement, and soon a relatively dense population will find homes on either side of the Harlem River.

It cannot be long before building enterprises are active on the West Side, and we urge architects to plan out rows of dwellings on the rear instead of the front of lots affected by the elevated roads.

LEGAL DECISIONS.

ASSUMPTION OF PARTNERSHIP DEBTS-EFFECT OF ACCEPTANCE OF NEW SECURITY BY CREDITOR.

ACCEPTANCE OF NEW SECURITY BY CREDITOR. The Court of Common Pleas has decided the following: A. sold merchandise to the firm of B. & C., which firm was subsequently dissolved, C. taking the assets and agreeing to pay the debts of the firm. B. immediately called upon A., who was a creditor of the firm, and notified him of the dissolution and the agreement of C., and requested him "to go and get his money." Notwithstanding this notification, A. did nothing for about five months, when he accepted the individual notes of C. for the debt, and when they matured C. had become insolvent. A. thereupon sued B. & C. for the indebtedness. B. defended upon the ground that by the arrangement beupon, the ground that by the arrangement be-tween the copartners at the time of their dissolution, C. became the principal debtor and B. a mere surety; and that the neglect of A. to collect the debt when requested so to do by B., and the acceptance by such creditor of the individual notes of C., thereby giving him time for pay-

ment of the indebtedness, discharged B. from

Held, that the taking of the individual notes of C., did not necessarily imply payment of the debt, but operated to extend the time of payments of the principal claim to the effect sufficient ment of the original claim, to the effect sufficient to discharge the surety B.

USURY--SECOND MORTGAGEE CANNOT AVAIL HIM-SELF OF USURY IN A PRIOR MORTGAGE.

The Supreme Court of Wisconsin was recently called upon to consider the question, whether a junior or second mortgagee could set up the defeace of usury to a prior mortgage, in order to avoid the same, and thereby cause the junior or second mortgagee to become a first mortgage? The Court held, that as the mortgagor did not avail himself of the defence of usury, the second mortgagee cannot do so; that the defence of usury is so exclusively personal that it cannot be made by a junior mortgagee. The object of a usury law is to protect the horrower against the oppres-sive exactions of the lender, and that it is not essential to the complete promotion of that object, that other persons than the victim of the usurer, or persons standing in legal privity with him, should have the benefit of the defence.

ORDER BY CREDITOR ON DEBTOR TO PAY THIRD PERSON.

The Superior Court of Buffalo has decided that where a creditor sends an order to his debtor to deliver certain specified merchandise to a third deriver certain specified merchandiss to a third person, and charge the price thereof to the creditor's account, that this does not operate as an equitable assignment of the debt. A mere acceptance, and promise by the debtor to comply with the order being made without any new consideration, imposes no new liability upon him, either to the creditor or to the third party.

MORTGAGE BY HUSBAND AND WIFE—SURPLUS MONEYS ON FORECLOSURE.

The same court (Superior Court of Buffalo), hold that where husband and wife are tenants in common of land, and the property is mortgaged by them to secure a loan made to the husband, the wife becomes his surety to the extent of her one-half interest in the mortgaged premises. Upon a foreclosure of the mortgage and sale thereunder of the premises, to satisfy the debt, in case a surplus arises upon such sale, she is entitled to be mid therefore a cum such sale, she is entitled to be paid therefrom a sum equal to one-half of the gross proceeds of the sale, before any part of such surplus is paid to her husband, and her assignees or grantees succeed to her rights.

INSURANCE-PROOF OF LOSS BEFORE WHOM MADE.

MARKET REVIEW.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

Since our last report very few sales have beeh held at the Exchange Salesroom. At private sale, eight lots on the north side of One Hundred and Twentieth street. 100 east of Morningside Park, were sold by John McClave for \$14,400.

During the week 16 plans, embracing 39 buildings, the estimated cost of which is \$121,450, have been filed with the Superintendent of Buildings. The Rhinelander Estate will erect a six-story brick store and tenement on the southwest corner of Second avenue and Eighty-sixth street, cost \$110,000; eight five-story brick flats will be erected on the southeast corner of Washington and Gansevoort streets, cost \$101,000. On the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, west of Sixth avenue, W. M. Wilson proposes to build seven three-story stone front dwellings and John Davidson will erect five four-story dwellings on north side of Seventy-fourth street, east of Madison avenue.

BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

BRICKS .- By the time our last report reached the readers of THE RECORD the rates pamed on Common Hards were lower than any dealer would have accepted, and the market has since continued on the upward turn with a tendency to considerable excitement at times developed. A sort of brick famine, in fact, has prevailed, and, as noted in our last, a great many builders found it impossible to proceed with their work, owing to the absence of supplies. The manufacturers are doing all in their power to meet the deficiency, and everything is shipped the moment it is fit for use, but neither the amounts sent in from the Hudson River yards or other sources meets the requirements of the situation. The causes leading to the present condition of the market have already been referred to so often, we omit further repeti i any about the only new development being an admission, by even the buyers, that from the present outlook there is little to encourage the hope of any early reaction. Under existing circumstances it is impossible to give a close and reliable quotation, as there is daily, and when any stock is here almost hourly fluctuations, but with the latest sales up to present writing we hear of nothing below \$6 per M. and some of the best cargoes of Haverstraws are said to have reached \$7 per M. Almost any Pale Brick would bring \$3.50 and the best \$4 per M. Fronts selling quite in proportion to the more ordinary grades and while quoted as before there is a probability that rates on Croton at least will soon he advanced. CEMENT.-Domestic continues in very good demand and most of the companies are busy, though to some extent only pushed on back orders as the vast purchases for shipment have fallen off in price; \$1.00 is the quotation for Rosendale, delivered here, but we have good reason to believe that the most, if but we have good reason to believe that the most, if not all, of our leading jobbers could sell at this with a margin for profit. Foreign and domestic Portland sells fairly on most of the usual outlets, the only recent incidents of note being the award to the G. B. White & Bro. brand, for the Washington monument job. On the general range of prices about former figures are obtained, and, as every manufacturer, dealer and importer says his particular brand is the best on the market, and rapidly displacing all competitors, the selling interest may be considered as in a happy frame of mind. There was exported from this port 3,125 bbls of cement, the bulk of which went to Cuba.

HARDWARE. - Business is improving somewhat. Export orders have in some cases been quite full, the interior call commences to be heard with increasing vigor, and local consumption is holding its own. Dealiers have in no case been hurried, nor is the business generally distributed throughout the trade, but the "symptoms" of improvement are looked upon as strong and encouraging for all. Supplies are well assorted and pretty full, as calculations are based upon a liberal fall distribution of the principal descriptions of domestic hardware and a fair proportion of foreign. Values in pretty much all cases are firmly supported. About the only changes noticeable since our last is that by which the price of augers and bits is fixed at a discount of 50 per cent.; orders for 50 doz., 50 and 5 per cent., and orders for 100 dos., 50 and 10 per cent. Sargent & Co, have made an advance of about 10 per cent. in the price of Cast Butts. interior call commences to be heard with increasing

LATH .- In all general particulars the condition of affairs on this market remains favorable for the selling interest. A pretty good supply of stock has been offering, and nearly every receiver having a cargo or two to dispose of, there was enough competition to give irregularity to values, with a further disturbing element also found in the unattractive condisturbing element also found in the unattractive condition of the offering. All these things considered, therefore, the fact that fluctuations extended over a range of only about 1% per M. and that the great bulk of the supply found a place soon after arrival is accepted as an evidence of latent strength with the probabilities more in favor of an advance than a decline. Especially should the anticipated reduction in supply take place. From \$1.35 up to \$1.42% has been about the two extremes of late, with \$1.40 on most of the sales.

LIME.-It is still a very dull and stupid market, with little or nothing to add to former reports. Some arrivals take place, and by careful management they are disposed of but no open demand prevails, and receivers have all the stock they want. The great trouble with the market is, of course, the accumulation, good, bad and indifferent still remaining in second hands, some of it carried since last winter, and, until this is out of the way, new cargoes will not have much chance Nominally, Eastern may be quoted at 60 and 75c, repectively, for the two grades.

LUMBER.-On pretty much all the leading styles of lumber there is a well-sustained range of values and a good average business doing. The total, in fact, keeps up to quite as full proportions as for many weeks past, and shows some indications of a greater increase. For local consumption, both in the way of building and manufacturing, buyers afford a steady movement of supplies, which, if anything, exceeds early expectations, while the shipping outlet has proven quite as full in the aggregate as could be expected. There has been some disappointment over a few South American orders, which were filled at provincial ports on slightly better terms than could be afforded here; but on West India account the business holds its own. Some of the 'anadians have been talking about taking the West India trade away from this port, but our dealers feel little alarm over the matter, apparently, and assert that, in point of fact, this is about the only port where an assortment of proper character to suit the outlet named can be made up. The general accumulation of supplies here is moderate still, and not making much progress toward an increase. weeks past, and shows some indications of a greater

A Chicago correspondent of the London Timber Trades Journal writes as follows upon the Deal

There is nothing new to be said about the deal trade. In point of fact, there is no such thing as a deal trade. The shipments from any of the lake ports this season will not amount to enough to be worthy of consideration. Beyond a few old contracts—very small ones—that are to be filled out, I cannot learn that anything will be done whatever. The deal business has died a natural death, and our saw millers manifest no disposition to attempt a resuscitation of the liteless industry.

Eastern Spruce continues to retain a good general market without many positive new features. Demand has been active enough to exhaust the offering of all really merchantable stock at least about as fast as offered, and, it is said, that some pretty poor cargoes have been disposed of lately at comparatively full rates. Receivers, however, appear disposed to refrain from any excessive exactions, and can, in most cases, be found willing to negotiate when prompt bids are made. We quote at \$10.500 il.25 for random, possibly \$11 55.001.75 for choice lengths is small cargoes, and \$12.00013.00 for specials, the extreme for extra difficult.

White Pine still fails to accumulate here to much of an extent. There does not appear to have been an actual scarcity of any quality and so far as shown all orders have found sufficient offering to satisfy them, yet, at the same time, little or nothing ran over, and supply and demand came out about even. Prices under the circumstances were held about steady and the general situation appears satisfactory to the selling interest. We quote at \$11.00015.00 per M for West India shipping boards; \$18.0020.00 for South. American do.: \$13014 for box board; \$15016 for dowide and sound, and timber to order at \$35045 per M. Yellow Pine, as a rule, continues to be very well supported in value and meets with a fair demand. Some dealers report a falling off in orders as compared with the first of the past month, but others appear to be quite as busy as usual, and in a few instances unwilling to enter into further contracts as the mills they represent are full until late fall. Not many randoms arrived, and when they do the sale is not difficult if anything like attractive quality can be shown. We quote random cargoes at about \$18022 per M.: ordered cargoes, \$22024 do.; green flooring boards, \$20021 do., and dry do. do. \$200203. Cargoes at the South \$13014.50 per M.: hewed

Shingles continue to find a very good market, and are steady in price. Now and then an outside lot is offered a little "off," but regular and carefully selected stocks have the confidense of owners, and are not urged for sale. Export orders keep up well, and there is a good proportion of home trade. Cypress are selling at about \$6 for saps and \$8.50@9.00 for hearts; pine shipping stocks, \$4 for 18 inch, and Eastern saw grades at \$2.50@4.50 for 16 inch, as to quality and quantity. Machine dressed cedar shingles quoted as follows; For \$0 inch, \$16@22.25 for A and \$28.75@

33.25 for No. 1; for 24-inch, \$6.50@16 for A and \$16.75 @23 for No. 1; for 20-inch, \$5@10.50 for A, and \$11.25 @15.75 for No. 1.

Hardwoods continue in very fair general demand, and there is a firm confident tone expressed by most dealers. Home wants are making an outlet for a great deal of all the leading styles, and a considerable quantity goes abroad, both in the log and cut. There is some variation in valuations by dealers, but mostly on the range of the figures for some time advised. We quote at wholesale rates by car-load about as follows: Walunt, \$77@55 per M.; ssh, \$33@36.do.; onk, \$27@40.do.; n aple, \$23@35; chestnut, 1st and 2d, \$24@35; do. do., culls, 18@20.do; cherry, \$45@75.do; white wood, 36 and 96 inch, \$25@27.50, and do. inch \$25@35 for good nearby stock.

The distribution from yard does not make any very great show, but its volume is on the whole pretty full and nearly or quite all our principal dealers are doing a satisfactory business. The supplies are moderate and prices in most cases quite steadily hald.

ALBANY LUMBER MARKET.

The Argus reports for the week ending July 29, 1879:

There has been a good attendance of buyers in the District since our last report with free inquiry, especially for box lumber, of which there have been free sales, including the lot of 2,00,00 feet for Greenpoint on p. t., but understood to be at \$12,550,13,00. Buyers of box lumber who, a short time ago, offered \$11 P M. only, now take hold readily of best lots, and at a shade off of cur outside quotations. The demand for clear lumber is greater than it has been for some years, and the District is pretty well cleared of this description, the stock being unusually light. Dry lumber of all kinds is getting very scarce. The general trade is very good for the season.

Canada lumber comes forward very slow; the first of the new cut has only reached the District within a few days.

Coarse lumber is in active call. The trade generally is seeking for large parcels, but dealers here propose holding on in the hope of an advance on present ligures, which are held with much firmness. What is being done is in small parcels only, and this course is prompted as well by light stocks as it is by an indisposition to sell large lines. There is still a lack of water at the Northern mills, and as a consequence receipts are light.

The Montreal Herald reports the shipment on Saturday of five barges with \$00,000 feet of spruce lumber for Burlington, Vt.

The East Saginaw Courier says 18.000,000 feet sold last week, mostly in cargo lots of 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 feet. Good green sells readily at \$5,510 and \$25 and choice at \$5.50 and \$11.25, which are the highest reported figures there given, with an active trade at the close and higher figures looked for, following the probable advance in lake freights in August, when new crop grain will be moving freely.

The receipts of lumber at Chicago from January 1st to July 19th are 590,727,000 feet, against 472,647,000 feet for a corresponding period in 1878. The shipments, 312,532,000 feet, against 285,259,000 feet. The receipts of lumber at Tonawanda so far as we have seen them reported during the week, have been 11,452,000 feet; the shipments therefrom by canal, 4,97,000 feet. THE WEST

CHICAGO, July 30, 1879.

Although the receipts of lumber during the week past have been fully up to the average, the supply at the wholesale market has been very light. Most of the lumber now arriving goes directly to the yards, being largely stock that was bought in the log by dealers and manufactured under contract. The bare appearance which the cargo market presents at a ti ne of year when it is ordinarily well supplied with lumber, is a strong indication that manufacturers accustomed to saw for this market have become disgusted with the prices they have been getting, and have resolved to pile up their lumber and wait for a better market. This seems to be the only reasonable explanation that can be made of the falling off in the consignments. The mills certainly have not shut down, and there is no other place at which any amount of pine can be exchanged for cash that is accessible to the Lake Michigan mill operators. The report of stock on the 1st instant, it will be remembered, showed that there was more lumber on hand then than a year ago at the same time, and there is no doubt but that the stock has been greatly increased in the last thirty days. This is a sensible action on the part of manufacturers, though the improvement in prices which may grow out of it is liable to prove only temporary. The lumber which they are piling up must all come here sometime, and it is a question whether the market will be in any better shape when it finally drops down upon it than it is now.

With the moderate supply, the demand has improved a trifle since last report and prices have consequently advanced a little. Piece stuff from Manistee of good quality and average length was sold this week for \$6.50, and transfers at \$6.25 and \$6.371/2 are common. Such lumber is not in as good demand. but some inquiry for it is noted-sufficient to warrant sellers in asking a slight advance which as far as is known they have not generally succeeded in getting, shingles are also in limited supply and some offerings are taken at better figures than have lately ruled. There is nothing to be said of the yard trade unless one should repeat the comments that have previously been made. There is absolutely no change in the situation to record. Trade keeps up to an unprecedented figure for midsummer, and there is a much smaller accumulation of stock at the yards than usual. It is hoped and generally expected that the monthly account of stock on hand for August 1 will show the decrease in the supply as compared with last year to be greater than it was a month ago. The dealers have considerable trouble yet in filling orders for dry lumber, many of the upper grades being practically out of the market-something which has not occurred at this time in the season for a number of years.

The fluctuations and uncertainties of the log market, were never better illustrated than by the current events of the last two months. The season commenced with a limited supply in the booms which were taken up as soon as the ice went out, at good round figures, say from \$7 to \$9 for early sawing, It was well known that a large amount had been cut in the West, and as soon as the logs began to arrive, prices dropped off about a dollar on the market, and few sales could be effected. The first of June found the water so low that it was questionable whether half the crop would be secured, whereupon the large buyers took hold freely and bought largely. Late in the month heavy rains started the logs and brought out a full stock. Now, several who were buying three weeks ago, are on the market selling, as they are evidently overloaded. So few sales are being maintained or not, nearly every transaction is on private terms.

Among the contracts of the week, we note L. L. Stanchfield 3,000,000 feet sold to Hastings and Red Wing mills at \$6 net. This is the first sale from the new St. Paul boom

wing minis at 50 net. This is the first sale from the new St. Paul boom.

Considering that it is harvest time, the demand for timber keeps up well at all points. St. Louis is receiving much less and shipping about twice as much as at the corresponding time last year. Chicago is also enjoying a very large trade and the same is true of all the other markets. Prices on green stuff can hardly be called firm at \$10 at the river markets, while Chicago has only nominal prices. Dry stuff is scarce and no concessions are made to any one.

Manufacturing is progressing unusually slow all along the river, especially at Minneapolis, where not over about 35,000.000 feet have been sawed up to this time. Everybody is anticipating a grand business this fall.
